(1) Construction -- Construction done by general contractors and special trade contractors which includes new work, additions, alterations, reconstruction, installations, repairs, remodeling, renovating, and repair of office buildings. Heavy construction other than buildings such as pipelines, communication and power lines, sewer and water mains, asphalt and concrete construction of roads, trenching, cable laying, conduit construction, land clearing and leveling.

(2) Commodities -- All materials, goods or tangibles purchased to conduct business, not including fuel or purchased power contracts and major equipment purchases and rentals.

(3) Others Services -- All specialty work, special circumstances that required contract labor, special consultants or other non-defined services. Examples include audio/visual, staffing services, landscaping, forestry, tree trimming, art and decorative services, janitorial, travel/lodging, automotive repair, and photography. (4) Professional Services -- Contracted professional services which include legal, consulting, health, engineering, accounting, advertising/marketing, architectural, real estate, computer services, research and analysis, education/training, insurance, surveying services, weather services, environmental, financial, etc.

(5) Major Equipment -- Includes all major equipment purchases and rentals including but not limited to transmission and distribution equipment, power plant equipment, substation equipment, heavy construction equipment, fleet requirements, etc. (6) HUB -- Business enterprises that are 51% owned and controlled by U.S. citizens who are socially disadvantaged because of their identification as members of certain groups, including African-American, Hispanic, Native American, or Asian Pacific and Women as defined in the Texas Government Code § 481.101(1).

(7) Other -- Any commodity or service not covered by the above categories.

(1) Describe the specific initiatives, programs, and activities undertaken under the plan during the preceding year:

During the preceding year, Mid-Plains Rural Telephone Cooperative, Inc. has continued the business relationships established during the normal course of business over a period of years, including Historically Underutilized Businesses which we have done business with in the past. In addition, we attempt to identify any other HUB's with which we can purchase goods and services. Since we are located in a small town in the Texas Panhandle, we are very limited in our choices. We have and will continue to purchase goods and services based on competitive price, quality and availability and will also continue to do business with established entities that can meet our needs based on those criteria.

(2) Make an assessment of the success of each of the specific initiatives, programs, and activities listed above:

As stated above, Mid-Plains Rural Telephone Cooperative, Inc. is located in a small town with limited choices. However, in our opinion, we are very successful in doing business with entities that are classified as HUB's. We do strive to be fair and objective when purchasing goods and services with a goal of obtaining competitive pricing and quality in mind.

(3) Describe the initiatives, programs, and activities the utility will pursue during the next year to increase the diversity of its workforce and contracting opportunities for small and historically underutilized businesses:

Our plan for the next year is to continue doing what we have successfully done in past years. We will purchase goods and services based on competitive price, quality and availability and where possible we will continue to do business with HUB's with which we have a relationship. Where possible, we will continue to develop new relationships with HUB's. Our workforce has been very well diversified for many years and we have no plans to alter our hiring practices. We will continue to hire the most qualified candidates when replacing or hiring new employees.

(4) State the specific progress made under the plan filed by the utility:

Since filing our last report, we have been able to add three new Hub's to our current list of suppliers. During the year 2003, we had one Hispanic male employee terminate his employment with our company to pursue other interests. We were successful in replacing this individual with another Hispanic male employee. We also had a termination of an employee of Asian decent that we have not yet found a suitable replacement. As in the past, we will fill this vacant position with the most qualified applicant.

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
