

(1) Describe the specific initiatives, programs, and activities undertaken under the plan during the preceding year:

For the past two years Westel has been utilizing Job Gusher as a means for the advertising and hiring of candidates for various administrative positions in Texas. Job Gusher is a recruiting program designed to introduce recent college graduates to potential employers.

Beginning in 2004 Westel started working with Texas Workforce Commission to hire recently unemployed candidates through "Work in Texas" and "Hire Texas". These are online job databases that fit jobseekers to employers.

(2) Make an assessment of the success of each of the specific initiatives, programs, and activities listed above:

Of the eighteen new hires in 2004, two were hired as a result of the programs listed above. Due to the turnover in several departments we have found the use of temporary agencies to be a more successful way to fill positions.

(3) Describe the initiatives, programs, and activities the utility will pursue during the next year to increase the diversity of its workforce and contracting opportunities for small and historically underutilized businesses:

Generally speaking, Westel has very low turnover. Therefore we do not have an immediate need to use these programs full-time. Westel will choose, whenever possible to participate in job fairs offered by Job Gusher. As our business expands in South Texas we foresee the need to hire more bilingual employees, and will utilize whatever resources that are available to hire qualified people.
