(1) Describe the specific initiatives, programs, and activities undertaken under the plan during the preceding year:

During the preceding year Coleman County Telephone Cooperative, Inc. has given special consideration to businesses that may be disadvantaged or underutilized, while at the same time, trying to patronize businesses in our local area. Even though we are a small company located in a very rural area, and may be somewhat limited in the number of available businesses with which we can work, we still make every effort to follow the guidelines that have been set forth.

(2) Make an assessment of the success of each of the specific initiatives, programs, and activities listed above:

Coleman County Telephone Cooperative, Inc. has been quite successful in some areas, in particular, in being able to do business with female and/or minority-owned businesses. Since we are a small company, we typically have little or no turnover in employees. However, we recently moved the customer representatives of our subsidiary into our business office, which gives us a Hispanic bi-lingual customer representative on site. This has already been an asset on several occasions.

(3) Describe the initiatives, programs, and activities the utility will pursue during the next year to increase the diversity of its workforce and contracting opportunities for small and historically underutilized businesses:

Coleman County Telephone Cooperative, Inc. will continue our established business relationships with underutilized businesses and will continue searching for new opportunities to do business with other small and/or underutilized businesses. Should the need arise for any new employees, we would make every effort to diversify our workforce with persons qualified in the particular job area where an employee was needed.

(4) State the specific progress made under the plan filed by the utility:

Coleman County Telephone Cooperative, Inc. continues to make progress in the particular areas of suppliers for all types of products, advertising agencies, contractors for electrical work, and other services, such as contract labor and specialty jobs, including paving, building and grounds work, etc. We also have on-site a Hispanic bi-lingual employee of our subsidiary, who, although not a direct employee of the cooperative, has been a great asset.

- (3) Construction -- Construction done by general contractors and special trade contractors which includes new work, additions, alterations, reconstruction, installations, repairs, remodeling, renovating, and repair of office buildings. Heavy construction other than buildings such as pipelines, communication and power lines, sewer and water mains, asphalt and concrete construction of roads, trenching, cable laying, conduit construction, land clearing and leveling.
- (4 Commodities -- All materials, goods or tangibles purchased to conduct business, not including fuel or purchased power contracts and major equipment purchases and rentals
