

Those persons must have proportionate interest and demonstrate active participation in the control, operation, and management of the partnership's affairs; or (D) a joint venture in which each entity in the joint venture is a historically underutilized business under this subdivision. shares of stock or other equitable securities is owned by one or more persons who are members of certain groups, including black Americans, Hispanic Americans, women, Asian Pacific Americans, and American Indians; (B) a sole proprietorship formed for the purpose of making a profit that is 100 percent owned, operated, and controlled by a person described by (1) HUB -- Pursuant to Texas Government Code § 481.191(4), HUB means: (A) a corporation formed for the purpose of making a profit in which at least 51 percent of all classes of the Paragraph (A) of this subdivision; (C) a partnership formed for the purpose of making a profit in which 51 percent of the assets and interest in the partnership is owned by one or more

(2) Small Business -- Pursuant to Texas Government Code § 481.191(6), Small Business means a corporation, partnership, sole proprietorship, or other legal entity that: (A) is domiciled in this state; (B) is formed to make a profit; (C) is independently owned and operated; and (D) employs fewer than 100 full-time employees.

(3) Construction -- Construction done by general contractors and special trade contractors which includes new work, additions, alterations, reconstruction, installations, repairs, remodeling, renovating, and repair of office buildings. Heavy construction other than buildings such as pipelines, communication and power lines, sewer and water mains, asphalt and concrete construction of roads, trenching, cable laying, conduit construction, land clearing and leveling.

4 Commodities - All materials, goods or tangibles purchased to conduct business, not including fuel or purchased power contracts and major equipment purchases and rentals

(5) Others Services -- All specialty work, special circumstances that required contract labor, special consultants or other non-defined services. Examples include audio/visual, staffing services, landscaping, forestry, tree trimming, art and decorative services, janitorial, travel/lodging, automotive repair, and photography.

(6) Professional Services -- Contracted professional services which include legal, consulting, health, engineering, accounting, advertising/marketing, architectural, real estate, computer services, research and analysis, education/training, insurance, surveying services, weather services, environmental, financial, etc.

(7) Major Equipment - Includes all major equipment purchases and rentals including but not limited to transmission and distribution equipment, power plant equipment, substation equipment, heavy construction equipment, fleet requirements, etc.

(8) Other -- Any commodity or service not covered by the above categories.

WORKFORCE AND SUPPLIER DIVERSITY FORM COMPANY INITIATIVES

(1) Describe the specific initiatives, programs, and activities undertaken under the plan during the preceding year:

Coleman County Telephone Cooperative, Inc. is a small company situated in a very rural area, which means that we are sometimes limited in the number of businesses in our vicinity with which we can work, but we still make every effort to follow the guidelines that have been set. We try to patronize businesses in our local area, while at the same time, we have given special consideration to businesses that may be disadvantaged or underutilized.

(2) Make an assessment of the success of each of the specific initiatives, programs, and activities listed above:

Coleman County Telephone Cooperative, Inc. has been quite successful in several areas and extremely successful in others, showing an increased percentage in almost every area. (Please see the percentage chart on Page 3 of the Workforce and Supplier Diversity Form, HUB/Small Business Procurement as a Percentage of Total Company Procurement.) You will notice that Major Equipment has increased significantly, along with substantial increases in Professional Services Contracts, Other Services, and services such as specialty work, contract labor, etc. We are a small office, with our subsidiary customer representatives in the same building. This provides us with a bi-lingual customer representative on site.

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(3) Describe the initiatives, programs, and activities the utility will pursue during the next year to increase the diversity of its workforce and contracting opportunities for small and historically underutilized businesses:

Coleman County Telephone Cooperative, Inc. will continue to build on the relationships that have already been established with underutilized businesses. As the needs for other services present themselves, we will view these as opportunities to search for other small and/or underutilized businesses with which to work. If we should find ourselves in the position to hire a new employee, we would make every effort to diversity our workforce with persons qualified
