



2022 was an interesting year to say the least. Record high costs associated with both goods and services compiled with higher than typical fuel costs for power purchased from our G&T has had a big impact on the financial stability of the cooperative. Mid-way through the year, FEC depleted its available loan funds thereby relying on operational revenue and investment accounts to remain afloat. Former General Manager, Lance Adkins, retired after forty-three years of service to our members, at the beginning of June and I officially took the reins.

The Board and management of Farmers' Electric Cooperative are pleased to inform the members that 2022 was a successful year as the Cooperative exceeded all financial targets established by the Board and lenders. Annual margins were just over \$1.6 million including a margin allocation of \$715,492

from our wholesale power supplier, Western Farmers Generation and Transmission Cooperative (WFEC). Farmers' Electric recorded total energy sales of 386,508 megawatt-hours (MWh), a decrease of 1.7 percent from sales in the previous year.

Due to the sound financial condition of your Cooperative, the Board of Trustees authorized the return of \$716,661.77 in patronage capital refunds. Prior to the Annual Meeting, all members of record in 1996 received 100 percent of the remaining balance of their capital credit allocation for that year, a total of \$626,725, with the remaining monies being returned on a



percentage basis to all members of record through 2021. To reduce the cost of printing and mailing refund checks, active members with refunds under \$100 received a credit on their April electric bill rather than a paper check. Over the past five years FEC has returned more than \$9.8 million in patronage capital refunds to the membership.

Wholesale power supply cost continues to be the greatest single component in what members pay for electricity, with almost 64 cents of every dollar paid last year used to purchase wholesale power. Renewable energy represented 35.4 percent of our energy resources last year, though we continue to view wind and solar resources as a fuel replacement. Wind and solar technology are dependent on the variability of wind and sun to operate and require that conventional generation resources remain online, ready to respond to support load. While wholesale power costs have been relatively low and stable for several years, Farmers' Electric began to see increases in the cost of wholesale power beginning late 2021. WFEC, our wholesale power provider, implemented a small decrease in base wholesale power rates in January of this year; however, the increase in generation fuel costs, primarily natural gas, were significantly higher in 2022.

I hope that you will be able to join us this year for the Cooperative's Annual Meeting in San Jon, New Mexico on May 13, 2023. Thank you for your continued support of the Cooperative and Cooperative employees who live and serve in your community.



The second electric cooperative to be organized in New Mexico, Farmers' Electric Cooperative was organized on December 20, 1937, and the Articles of Incorporation were issued on January 13, 1938.

The initial loan from REA in the amount of \$100,000 was used to construct 100 miles of distribution line to serve

approximately 100 consumers in Curry and Quay counties. The first section of line was energized on November 30, 1938, from the substation southeast of Clovis and ran a short distance east of Clovis, then north

to the communities of Pleasant Hill, Bellview, and Broadview.

From those humble beginnings, Farmers' Electric's service area now encompasses approximately 11,000 square miles with service to over 13,000 meters in seven New Mexico counties and three counties in far west Texas.

The Cooperative has had eight General Managers through the years. Each unique in their own way, they all had the Cooperative and its members' best interests in mind.

At 25% below the U.S. national average for electricity, Farmers' Electric is still a good deal. Over the years,

the Cooperative has seen steady, solid growth with safety, reliability, and value being the major drivers.

Today, Farmers' Electric has assets of over \$137 million, transmission line consisting of over

275 miles, over 4,000 miles of energized distribution line, 15 distribution substations, a headquarters building in Clovis, satellite offices in Fort Sumner and Santa Rosa, and several warehouse and support facilities.

Farmers' Electric still holds our founders' philosophy near and dear; to serve the interests of our member-consumers. For 85 years, the Cooperative has kept their dream alive and pledge to do so for a long time to come. Power of the people, by the people, for the people... it's the cooperative way.



<u>PROPOSED ADDITIONS TO BY DAWS</u>

The Cooperative's Board of Trustees and management would like to take this opportunity to inform the membership of the following proposed additions to Section 3. Easements, Article III Section 1. Annual Meeting, and Article IV. Section 3. Those portions of the statements in "Red" are proposed additions.

ARTICLE II SECTION 3. EASEMENTS.

Each member shall, upon being requested to do so by the Cooperative, and at no cost to the Cooperative, execute and deliver to the Cooperative rights-of-way over, on and under lands owned, leased or controlled by the member, as the Cooperative shall require for the furnishing of electric service to its members at any time or for the construction, operation, maintenance, repair, removal, exchange of its equipment or relocation of its facilities.

ARTICLE III SECTION 1. ANNUAL MEETING.

The Annual Meeting of the members shall be held not earlier than the first day of April nor later than the first day of August of each year at such place within the service area of the Cooperative as shall be designated by the Board in the notice of the meeting for the purpose of electing trustees, passing upon reports for the previous fiscal year and transacting such other business as may come before the meeting. It shall be the responsibility of the Board to make adequate plans and preparation for the Annual Meeting. The Board may, in its discretion, cancel or postpone the Annual Meeting if it is deemed to be in the public interest during circumstances beyond the reasonable control of the Board or the members. Failure to hold the Annual Meeting at the designated time shall not work a forfeiture or dissolution of the Cooperative.

ARTICLE IV. SECTION 3. NOMINATIONS, ELECTION, AND TENURE

(a) The terms of trustees elected shall be for three years and until a successor shall have been elected and qualified. The rotation is Districts 2 and 7, Districts 3 and 5, and Districts 1, 4, and 6. In the event an annual meeting is cancelled pursuant to ARTICLE III SECTION 1, all Trustees shall hold over or extend their current term for one year so as to maintain the election rotation.

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2023 Scholarship Winners

Over the past 36 years, the Farmers' Electric Education Foundation has been privileged to award scholarships to members, or dependents of members interested in attending an accredited vocational school, technical school, college, or university. In fact, the Foundation has awarded 1447 scholarships

totaling \$1,096,730. Each year the Foundation has awarded the maximum number of scholarships possible based on funds available and in 2023 will award (57), \$1,500 and (1), \$2,500 (Glenn Holland Memorial) scholarships to graduating high school seniors and college level students throughout our service area.

The Education Foundation is funded solely by the members of the cooperative through donated and unclaimed patronage capital refunds. These funds are invested in temporary cash investments consisting of certifi ates of deposit and mutual



funds. To ensure that these funds will continue to support higher education for many years to come, only the interest earned is used for scholarships. If it weren't for the gracious donation of patronage capital refunds (capital credits), this program would not be the success that it is.

In addition to the scholarship program, Farmers' Electric will sponsor two area high school juniors on the Government In Action Youth Tour held June 12 through June 18 in Washington, D.C. This is a general budgetary, continuing education program, independent of the Farmers' Electric Education Foundation.

A special "thank you" to the cooperative members in each community who volunteered their time to serve on the scholarship selection committees.

OPENING STATEMENT

ANNOUNCEMENT OF MAILING OF NOTICES


