Many had received letters announcing that Bonham had filed applications with the state to amend Certificates of Convenience and Necessity to obtain dual certifications with parts of Southwest Fannin County SUD And White Shed Water Supply Corp. and to decertify parts of Bois D' Arc MUD and Ravenna Nunnelee Water Supply Corp. regarding water and sewer utility service. Other residents in the same area received no letters. And everyone concerned wanted to know why.

The proposed utility service, area is 4.6 miles north, 1.9 miles south, 1.3 miles east the 4.2 miles west of downtown Bonham. The area is bounded on the north by FM 1753; on the east by Bois d'Arc Creek; on the south by FM 1629; and on the west by FM 398.

The people in the affected area didn't want city water and sewer. They already have water wells or water service and septic systems, many of those in the audience said.

The letters arrived with maps enclosed showing the CCN area to be encompassed. They gave a Nov 31 deadline for protesters to file any complaints. However, City Manager Blaine Hinds, at the meeting, said nothing is going to change and explained what those letters were all about.

The letters regarding the CCN for water and sewer are required by the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality because, in August, the city filed an application to expand and part of the city's obligation is to notify property owners in the area of the certificate, he said. Some people didn't get letters because the addresses were incorrect because of the 911 system, Hinds added.

"The reason we filed for a new certificate is that a year ago, Bois MUD filed application that encroached inside the city limits and Bonham has been going through a long procedure to redraw the lines of the application submitted by Bois d' Arc. In order to protect the city's future interest in terms of water and sewer service, we were advised that it was in our best interest to extend our certificate of convenience and necessity out to our extraterritorial jurisdiction limits, which is the planning area the state provides for each city."




