understand the distinction between those two types of 1 2 actions to be? Making application is a more formal process 3 Α 4 than requesting. And so making application for service has to 5 go before the city council? 6 Making application would eventually -- would 7 come before council. 8 So you haven't seen any applications for 9 water service outside the city limits in your tenure 10 on the council? 11 Correct. 12 Α And you're not aware of any during your 13 tenure on the planning and zoning commission? 14 No, I'm not. 15 Α You also testified for Mr. Rodriguez that the 16 city's planning and zoning commission jurisdiction for 17 platting only extends to the ETJ. Do you remember 18 19 that? Uh-huh. 20 Α Who has the jurisdiction outside the ETJ over 21 22 plats? I would think the county. 23 Α Would any sort of water service requests, 24 even if it was outside the city's ETJ, have to come to 25

the city if they wanted service from the city? 1 2 All right. A water request from -- service from the city, would it have to come to the city? 3 If it was outside the city limits or ETJ. 4 Well, I guess they could come make 5 6 application. Whether or not it would ever be granted is a different issue. 7 From the tenor of your answer, I would assume 8 that it wouldn't be granted if that was the case. 9 10 MR. RODRIGUEZ: Objection, Your Honor. 11 He's putting words --MR. CARLTON: I'm asking him to clarify. 12 MR. RODRIGUEZ: -- putting words in his 13 14 mouth and mischaracterizing his testimony. JUDGE NORMAN: It's cross-examination. 15 I'll permit it. 16 Well, if I misunderstood your question, 17 correct me. Someone that's outside of our CCN, 18 outside of our ETJ. Correct? 19 (BY MR. CARLTON) Right. 20 Drives down to city hall and says I need --21 Α "I would like to have water eight miles northwest of 22 here"? 23 Say four miles. 24 Q 25 Well, I'm saying eight. Α

Q Okay.

A Eight miles north of here. Yes, I guess they could come in and ask for it, but I doubt that we would take any real action on it. But there's a lot of other -- you know, I guess there's hundreds of circumstances that we need to look at first, but anybody could come in and ask. I mean, I guess you could ask if we'd bring it down to your house down here. So my tenor, you know, I kind of doubt that we'd do that.

Q So you explained for Mr. Rodriguez that the number of letters that were still considered by the city to be service requests was reduced to 41, and that that calculation already excluded the duplicates that we identified when I was cross-examining you earlier. Correct?

A 41 plus the 13; 53 (sic). It would have been 53 being the total number would be pretty accurate. We started with 55 this morning, and then it dropped to 53, but when we started going back through here and counting, we found what, four or five duplicates, meaning there's at least five extra pieces of paper in there that don't need to be there. And there were a total of 63, did I say, minus five; 58. Minus the one or two that are properties that might be in the

1	contested area or the overlap between Gainesville and
2	Lindsay's CCN, so down to 56 55, 56.
3	Q How many of those remaining requests are
4	south of 82, do you know?
5	A Ooh, I don't know that.
6	Q Would you be able to determine that by taking
7	the requests and matching names to the area to the

9	A I would think so.
10	Q Except I guess the only challenge there would
11	be in the case of somebody who owned properties both
12	north and south, we wouldn't know which property they
13	were requesting. Right?
1 4	A Well, I would assume they were requesting

17	would still be in an area that we're hoping to get.
18	MR. CARLTON: No further questions.

MARONEY, 18 having been first duly sworn, testified as follows: 19 DIRECT EXAMINATION 20 21 BY MR. RODRIGUEZ: Good afternoon, Mr. Maroney. 22 Good afternoon. 23 Of course we've met. Can you introduce 2.4 yourself to the Judge, please? 25

1 My name is Kerry Don Maroney. Α 2 Mr. Maroney, were you in the courtroom earlier when Mr. Metzler testified? 3 I was. Α 4 I'm going to ask you to turn to Page 14 of 5 your testimony, and did you hear testimony regarding 6 three additional connections for water and sewer? 7 Α I did. 8 9 Okay. Do you have any changes to your testimony there? 10 On Line 4 of my testimony, I had stated that 11 Α "Lindsay currently has approximately 396 water 12 connections." That should go to "399." 13 In addition, I stated that "396 sewer 14 connections," and that should also go to "399." 15 And then on Line 7, I talk about 16 "approximately 470 additional homes without any 17 expansion." That should go to "467." 18 Anything in the next paragraph? 19 Then also on Line 11, that "304 additional 20 Α customers" should be dropped by three to "301." 21 Okay. Now, I think we went through this 22 earlier where we attached KDM-10. Would it be okay to 23 strike the -- on Line 8 the sentence that begins with 24

"A copy" of that same page?

1	A Yes.
2	Q Okay. So we can strike that sentence?
3	A That's correct.
4	Q Now, with the corrections that I described as
5	well as the ones that you just made Mr. Maroney, if I
6	asked you the same questions today, would your answers
7	be the same?
8	A They would.
9	MR. RODRIGUEZ: Your Honor, at this
10	point, I move for admission of Lindsay Exhibit APP-3.
11	JUDGE NORMAN: Okay. Except for
12	objections already made and ruled on, any other
13	objections?
14	MR. MacLEOD: No, Your Honor.
15	MR. CARLTON: No, Your Honor.
16	JUDGE NORMAN: Okay. It's admitted,
17	subject to those objections and rulings.
18	(Exhibit APP No. 3 admitted)
19	Q (BY MR. RODRIGUEZ) Mr. Maroney, I believe at
20	this time the Judge would like a summary of your
21	testimony, please. You can provide that in a
22	narrative format.
23	A Okay. Your Honor, as you're aware, the City
2 4	of Lindsay currently holds both a water CCN
25	certificate and also a wastewater or a sewer CCN

certificate, the water being the 13025 and the sewer being the 20927 numbers.

You're also aware on August 31, 2005
Lindsay did file to amend both certificates to include
an additional area, and the only protest to this
amendment was Lindsay Pure Water Company.

As documented in my prefiled testimony dated June 9, 2008 and as amended today, I on behalf of Lindsay rendered a professional opinion as to Lindsay's ability to provide continuous and adequate service to the requested service area.

Having reviewed the application, having reviewed TCEQ compliance history in addition to performing some evaluation and analysis of the city's water and sewer facilities, I have determined that the City of Lindsay does have excess capacity available in the system.

And in addition to that, based on the criteria to be considered when amending a CCN application in accordance with 291.102(d)(1) through (8), it's my opinion that the City of Lindsay does have the managerial and technical capabilities to provide continuous and adequate service to the proposed area. And, therefore, it's my recommendation and opinion that this amendment to the water CCN be

granted. 1 Mr. Maroney, you have -- you represent many 2 water utilities and sewer utilities throughout the 3 state. Is that correct? 4 5 Α I do. Now, are you familiar with the TCEQ rules on 6 granting or amending certificates of convenience and 7 necessity? 8 I am. 9 Α Now, you have attached to your testimony, 10 which has been admitted, many different exhibits, that 1 1 you utilize in rendering your -- or do you utilize 12 those in rendering your professional expert opinion? 13 Α I do. 14 Now, Mr. Maroney, is it -- are the documents 15 0 and the data that you used to formulate your opinion 16 the type that would be reasonably relied upon by other 17 experts in rendering opinions on certificates of 18 convenience and necessity? 19 I believe so. Α 20 And you utilize that data to form your 21 Q opinions or make inferences based on CCNs. Is that 22 correct? 2.3 That's correct. Α 24

MR. RODRIGUEZ:

Okay. Your Honor, at

1	this point, I tender the witness for
2	cross-examination.
3	JUDGE NORMAN: Okay. Mr. MacLeod?
4	MR. MacLEOD: We don't have any
5	questions.
6	JUDGE NORMAN: Okay. Mr. Carlton?
7	MR. CARLTON: That was quick.
8	CROSS-EXAMINATION
9	BY MR. CARLTON:
10	Q Good afternoon, Mr. Maroney.
11	A Good afternoon, sir.
12	Q I have a couple of questions for you.
13	JUDGE NORMAN: Lawyers always say that.
14	I've heard that said many, many times, and I've never
15	heard it said truthfully actually, but that's not to
16	say
17	MR. CARLTON: Define "couple."
18	JUDGE NORMAN: Right.
19	(Laughter)
20	Q (BY MR. CARLTON) If you would turn to
21	Page 14 of your testimony?
22	A Okay.
23	Q You indicate that Lindsay has three wells
24	from which it can provide service to approximately 301
25	additional customers. What is the well capacity of

each of those wells? 1 2 The well capacity sometimes is hard to determine. I'm going to assume that you're asking 3 about the pump capacity. 4 Yes, the current pump capacity for those 5 0 6 wells. Currently, as best I can determine, Well 7 No. 1 pumps about 120 gallons a minute, Well No. 2 8 about a hundred gallons a minute and then Well No. 3 9 10 about 200 gallons a minute for a total of 11 approximately 420 gallons a minute. And what's the requirement for well capacity 12 13 per connection? It depends on the system, but in general 14 Α 15 minimum well capacity for Lindsay, for example, is six-tenths of a gallon a minute per connection. 16 And what circumstances might that be 17 different? 18 There are times you can get a reduction based 19 on use filing an engineering report, but for the most 2.0 part, the requirement as set forth under the minimum 21

A In Texas Administrative Code 290, I think
.45, but I'll be happy to look for you.

And where are those standards found?

standard is six-tenths of a gallon a minute.

22

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24

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Okay. I'm going to -- I'm going to tell you 1 that you're correct. It is 290.45. 2 Now, when you evaluate system capacity, 3 do you use the standards that are set out in 290.45 in 4 order to determine what the minimum -- what number of 5 connections a system can meet and still satisfy the 6 minimum requirements? 7 I do. 8 Α So in this case, you would take the 420 gpm 9 and divide it by the .6 to come up with a total number 10 of connections? 11 That would be correct. 12 And how many connections would that be? 13 Q About 700. 14 Α So then you would just subtract the number of 15 Q existing connections to figure out how many additional 16 connections they could serve? 17 That's correct. Α 18 So in this case, we're subtracting the 399 19 from the 700, which is going to leave you -- help me 20 2.1 with my math. 301. 22 Α 301, okay. Now, are there other requirements 23 for -- minimum requirements for capacity of water 24 system facilities?

There are, in fact, a number of them: 1 storage, pressure maintenance facilities, high service 2 pump capacity, distribution capacity, minimum 3 operating pressure based on a gallon and a half a 4 minute per connection throughout the distribution 5 system, maintaining a minimum of 35 psi. So, yeah, 6 there's a number of them. I don't know how much 7 detail you want me to go into, but I'm more than happy 8 9 to. You're the expert. And all those are found 10 Q in 290.45. Correct? 11 The distribution system may be in another 12 section that has to do with 1.5 gpm per connection and 13 maintaining a minimum of 35, but in 290 anyway. 14 Okay. Are there differences in requirements 15 0 for systems of different sizes? 16 Α There are. 17 So in this instance with Lindsay having 399 18 connections, what category do they fall in? 19 They'd fall in the category of more than 250 20 connections. 21 What are the other categories? 22 I'd have to look, but below 250 is another 2.3 category. I could look to tell you. 24

25

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Okav.

Do you have a copy of the rules with

you? 1 2 I think I do. Would you mind getting those? And so would 3 you let us know where you are looking for this 4 5 information? I'm looking in Section 290.45 under Minimum 6 Water System Capacity Requirements and starting at (b) 7 Community water systems. "Groundwater supplies must 8 meet the following requirements: If fewer than 50 9 connections without ground storage, the system must 10 meet the following requirements; well capacity of 11 1.5." So it gives -- would you like me to go down 12 through there, or what do you want me to do? 13 MR. CARLTON: I think what we can do is 14 in order to avoid going through that, I just ask, 15 Judge, would you take official notice of 30 TAC 16 290.45? 1.7 JUDGE NORMAN: Any objections? 18 MR. MacLEOD: No. 19 JUDGE NORMAN: I do so. And are we 20 talking about -- has that rule been changed since the 21 filing of the application? Do we know? According to 2.2 Ms. Benter, it has not. 23 MR. RODRIGUEZ: The rules indicate that 24

it was last updated February of 2004.

1 JUDGE NORMAN: Okay. MR. RODRIGUEZ: The historical date. 2 JUDGE NORMAN: Okay. Okay. 3 (BY MR. CARLTON) So did you -- were you 4 asked to make a determination of the sufficiency of 5 Lindsay's other facilities to serve additional 6 connections? 7 Α I was. 8 And did you determine that they were able to 9 provide additional service? 10 Α I was. 11 JUDGE NORMAN: You did. Right? 12 I did. 13 Α JUDGE NORMAN: Right. Okay. 14 (BY MR. CARLTON) Do Lindsay's existing 15 Q facilities have capacity to serve the entire proposed 16 CCN area? 17 The short answer to that is yes. 18 Α And are you assuming that there are -- the 19 service demands within that area are the equivalent of 2.0 the development that is there today? 21 I don't understand your question. 22 Α When you say yes, that those facilities are 23 capable of serving the entire area, I assume -- and 24

correct me if I'm wrong -- I assume that you mean all

those facilities have sufficient capacity to provide service to any request for service within that entire area. Is that correct?

A That's not correct.

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2.2

Q So is it really -- is your testimony actually that those facilities could be expanded if needed to provide service anywhere in the proposed CCN?

A My testimony is that, in fact, that the water supply of which we just went through at the 301 additional connections is actually the most restrictive portion of the existing system as far as what TCEQ looks at on the minimum requirements. In fact, when you look at pressure maintenance facilities, they can go up --

Q So let me stop you for a second because I think what my question -- what my question was, is there sufficient capacity within the existing Lindsay system to serve the entire requested area? And you said yes -- the short answer was yes. But if the limiting factor is the well pump capacity at 301 additional connections, is it your testimony that there are only going to ever be 301 connections within the entire proposed CCN area?

A I don't ultimately know what that -- what that capacity is, but the facilities that we have in

place right now would be utilized to serve the entire 1 area as it relates to pressure maintenance, water supply and storage facilities. 3 So if you would pull out -- I believe what's 4 attached to your testimony as KDM-6, and I'd like for 5 you to take a look at the southern end of that map. I 6 believe there's some property down off 1630 owned by 7 C. Hellinger. Do you see that property? 8 I do. 9 Α Are the town of Lindsay's existing facilities 10 sufficient to provide service to that tract? 11 They would be utilized to provide service to 12 that tract. 13

Okay. And what distribution improvements Q would be necessary to provide service to that tract?

That would have to be looked at in part of a Α service plan to be able to -- the most efficient way to provide service to that. However, the City of Lindsay does have a six-inch waterline just north of the Elm Fork of the Trinity River. That would be one area that could be looked at to extend that line to provide service to that area.

- How far would that line extension be? Q
- Do you have a scale?

(Discussion off the record)

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It could be about 12,000 feet or so, 13,000, 1 somewhere in that neighborhood. 2 (BY MR. CARLTON) And so were you here for 3 the testimony of Mr. Metzler? 4 5 Α Yes. And we discussed Lindsay Pure Water Company 6 Exhibit 8, which is the city's policy for how they 7 extend service outside the city limits. Do you recall 8 9 that? Correct. Α 10 Do you recall that there's a six-inch minimum 11 0 12 line size in that ordinance? In that particular ordinance? Α 13 14 0 Yes. I heard the discussion about that. 15 Okay. So if we assume that that six-inch 16 0 minimum line size is correct, what would the cost to 17 construct a six-inch line from the Elm Fork of the 18 Trinity all the way to the Hellinger property be? 19 Construction costs, something in the 20 Α 21 neighborhood of 250,000. And is that -- are you using a cost per 22 linear foot to make that calculation? 23 Using about \$18 a foot, I believe. 24 Α Would the city's existing elevated storage 25

tank be sufficient to provide water service to the 1 2 Hellinger tract? It would provide a portion of it. 3 How would you provide the other portion? 4 You might modify the pump station at Pump 5 6 Station No. 1 to provide additional pressure 7 There's an existing pressure tank at maintenance. Pump Station No. 1 at the present time. Depending on 8 the elevation -- I don't know the elevation down here 9 for the Hellinger tract, but depending on what that 10 11 elevation was and the route that you took for that line, that's the most direct shot, that route you took 12 13 for that line. The elevated storage would supply some of that -- some of that capacity. 14 15 So you'd have to make improvements to the booster station? 16 17 That's a possibility. Α Would it be possible to provide the service 18 19 without those improvements and without any other elevated storage? 20 I'd have to look at that and see. 21 22 What would you need to see in order to determine that? 2.3 I'd need to know what demand you had in 24

that from the Hellinger tract. I'd need to know what

1 demand you had between there and the river. I would 2 also need to know what the elevation is at the 3 Hellinger tract. Have you reviewed the service requests that 4 5 are attached as Exhibit KDM-5 to your testimony? I have. 6 Α 7 Do those provide you with any information 8 that would enable you to determine how much service 9 demand there would be along that route? 10 JUDGE NORMAN: That's KDM-10, I guess. 11 Is that right? 12 MR. CARLTON: No. It's actually KDM-5. 13 It's DLM-10. 14 JUDGE NORMAN: DLM-10, okay. Okay. 15 Only that there's a location there in a Α request and a need for service at that location or at 16 17 those locations, but no volumes or quantities are so 18 stated. 19 (BY MR. CARLTON) So you don't have a way to 20 determine, based on these letters, what the magnitude of the need is? 21 22 That's correct. Α 23 Is it possible that it would be less 24 expensive just to construct a new completely separate 25 standalone system to serve the Hellinger tract than

the Lindsay system?

- A I'm sorry?
- Q Is it possible that it would be less expensive to construct a standalone system to serve the Hellinger tract than it would be to extend the Lindsay system?
 - A That's a possibility.
- Q How would you -- would that determination on whether to construct a standalone system or extend the Lindsay existing system be based upon cost?
- A I think that's one factor you could look at.

 Another would be -- reliability would be another issue to look at. Once again, it would depend on when -- let's say the Hellinger tract came in and, in fact, made an application for service and enumerated and quantified their demands. Then those decisions would and could be made at that time based on an engineering study or evaluation.
- Q Are you aware of any specific requests for service to be extended for any of the areas south of Highway 82 and outside the City of Lindsay's existing CCN?
- A Well, as I note on KDM-6 and as I tie those back to those letters for the requests for service and the request to be included in their CCN, yes,

that's -- and they're so indicated and locations are so indicated on KDM-6.

Q Let me restate the question or rephrase it then so it's a little more clear. Perhaps I didn't ask it well. Are you aware of any applications for service where people have asked the town of Lindsay to actually extend water service to their tract within a given amount of time or with a certain quantity of service for any areas south of state highway -- or U.S. 82 and the existing CCN of Lindsay?

A No, sir, I am not.

Q Do you know what type of waterlines are within the Lindsay water system?

A For the most part, PVC is my understanding.

Q Have you been asked to go out and inspect any of the Lindsay system, or is this just based on your communication with other folks?

A I made two site visit inspections to the site.

Q Okay. What did you inspect? What did you visit?

A I visited Well No. 3, Well No. 2, Pump

Station No. 2, Well No. 1 and Pump Station No. 1 and an elevated tank site. And in addition to that, I visited the wastewater treatment plant, visited with

Joe Geray, inspected and looked at some stockpile of 1 pipe that Lindsay typically uses for installation of 2 3 their waterlines. 4 So your opinion on the PVC is based upon your 5 seeing that pipe on hand? 6 And discussions with Joe Geray. Α 7 JUDGE NORMAN: Let me ask you a 8 question. It was back a while ago. Was your 9 testimony regarding how much it would cost, \$250,000 1.0 to get to the Hellinger property, was that based on 11 six-inch pipe? Did you assume that? 12 I believe the question that he had asked was 13 what would it cost to run six-inch pipe --JUDGE NORMAN: Okay. 14 15 Α -- from the existing Lindsay system to the 16 Hellinger property. 17 JUDGE NORMAN: Okay. 18 And that six-inch pipe was PVC C-900 pipe. Α 19 JUDGE NORMAN: And that's about \$18 a 20 foot? 21 That's about what I used. Α 22 JUDGE NORMAN: Uh-huh, okay. 23 (BY MR. CARLTON) Let me go back to that one. 0 24 You said it was 12,000 -- about 12,000 feet. How did 25 you measure that distance?

I measured that distance down 3108, straight 1 2 shot down 3108 from about the north -- or the Elm Fork 3 of the Trinity River due south. And does crossing the Elm Fork of the Trinity 4 Q present any additional impact on the costs? 5 6 Α Very little. 7 But it does have an impact? 0 8 It does have an impact. Α 9 And you were just contemplating construction costs for the pipe, not easement acquisition or any 10 11 other sort of property acquisition necessary for the 12 waterline. Correct? 13 I just gave you an estimated construction Α 14 cost. You attached to your testimony as part of the 15 Q basis for your opinion Exhibit KDM-8. Was that 16 17 intended to show the growth in the town of Lindsay? Typically when I review and look at these 18 Α particular projects, I try to go back to the U.S. 19 Census Bureau and at least get an idea. 20 And as you 21 know, the U.S. Census Bureau does population 22 projections, and the last census was 2,000. So I try to look at, on a population basis, about where we are 23 24 in 2006, 2007, 2008. And so that just happened to be

from the U.S. Census Bureau the latest that they had.

So I look at that population, correct. 1 2 And you look at that in order to determine 3 what sort of growth you expect in the area? I do, from time to time. 4 5 And so from July 1, '05 through July 1, '06, 6 this U.S. Census Bureau data indicates that there 7 was -- the city grew from 957 to 1,003. Right? 8 That's what it shows. 9 Okay. How many new homes would you estimate 10 that to be? 11 Α I couldn't tell you. 12 What sort of population do you typically 13 estimate as the number of people per household? 14 If you're looking at equivalent homes, you 15 use about two and a quarter, two and a half. 16 So if we took the 1,003 and subtracted 0 the 957, what is it, about 46, 46 new people? Divide 17 18 that by 2.5, how many homes is it? 19 Α About 18. 20 About 18 homes in that one-year period. 21 So if you would pull out LPWC-9 -- I 22 don't know if it's out there. It's not one you've 23 looked at yet. Do you have it there in front of you? 24 Α I do. 25 Would you turn to Page 491?

1	A Okay.
2	Q And how many building permits were issued for
3	new homes from July 1, 2005 through July 1, 2006?
4	A I'm sorry. Give me those dates again.
5	Q July 1, 2005 through July 1, 2006.
6	A I guess I don't see that on this on this
7	particular sheet.
8	JUDGE NORMAN: You have to use two
9	sheets to do that.
10	MR. CARLTON: You have to use two
11	sheets. I'm sorry. Use the following Page 492 as
12	well.
13	JUDGE NORMAN: Start in the middle
14	of 491.
15	A You want to go through July of '06?
16	Q (BY MR. CARLTON) Through July 1, '06, that's
17	correct.
18	A Looks like maybe 12.
19	Q Okay. And then based on your assumption of
20	2.5 people per house, that would be 30 30 folks,
21	2.5 times 12?
22	A Correct.
23	Q So if we take that number and work off then
24	the 46, really most of the growth in Lindsay is
25	occurring because these new homes are being built in

Right? 1 Lindsay. I think you could make that assumption. 2 Do you know whether the Census Bureau 3 information is just for the City of Lindsay city 4 limits, or is it for the surrounding area as well? 5 It's my understanding it's the city limits. 6 So that growth information doesn't tell us 7 anything about the area outside the city limits? 8 9 No, sir. Α Would it be an indication of I guess a 10 limited amount of growth if there were no subdivisions 11 being created in the ETJ and surrounding areas in the 12 town -- in the areas surrounding the town of Lindsay? 13 That would be an indicator. 14 Would you turn to Page 8 of your prefiled 15 testimony? In particular let's look at Line 21, your 16 statement "There is currently no other water service 17 provider in the proposed territory," and that's not an 18 accurate statement, is it? 19 JUDGE NORMAN: What line is that? 20 MR. CARLTON: Line 21, Page 8. 21 JUDGE NORMAN: Okay. 22 MR. RODRIGUEZ: With the update, Your 23 Honor, it's actually on Line 22. 24 JUDGE NORMAN: Okay. 25

Oh, I see. 1 MR. CARLTON: There you go. 2 Line 22. I believe it is. 3 Α (BY MR. CARLTON) So you didn't go out and 4 Q 5 attempt to verify whether Lindsay Pure Water Company 6 was providing service in the quarter mile outside its 7 existing CCN? 8 Α I did not verify that much. Would it surprise you if it is doing that? 9 0 10 Would it surprise me? Α 11 If Lindsay Pure Water is providing service within a quarter mile of its CCN? 12 13 Α They may be. There would be an impact on Lindsay Pure 14 15 Water if this CCN application is granted over the area 16 that Lindsay Pure Water is already serving, wouldn't 17 there? There would be a minimal impact. 18 Α Minimal. So do you know how many connections 19 20 Lindsay Pure Water is serving outside of its CCN? 2.1 Α I do not. 22 MR. RODRIGUEZ: I object. The question assumes facts not in evidence, Your Honor. 23 24 MR. CARLTON: Mr. Myrick is going to 25 testify in a little while.

JUDGE NORMAN: Well, you can ask him a 1 hypothetical if you want to. 2 (BY MR. CARLTON) So you're stating it would 3 Q be a minimal impact without any basis or understanding 4 for what actual impact it would have to Lindsay Pure 5 Water, aren't you? 6 To the best of my knowledge, there has been 7 no CCN granted by TCEQ within the proposed service 8 Therefore, if there is service in that area, 9 area. it's not being done within a CCN. 10 But if this CCN is granted through the City 11 of Lindsay and Lindsay Pure Water Company is providing 12 service within that area, was is the impact to Lindsay 13 Pure Water? 14 The impact would be whatever they're serving 15 Α in there would likely be in jeopardy. 16 So they would have to stop serving those 17 18 connections? Or they would -- they could actually serve as 19 Α contracted with Lindsay if they wanted to, to continue 20 that service within Lindsay's CCN. 21 But that would be subject to the discretion 2.2 of the town of Lindsay as to whether or not they would 23 enter into that agreement? 24

It would be.

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Α

1	Q So the risks to Lindsay Pure Water Company is
2	that they would then have to terminate service to
3	however many connections there were within that
4	quarter mile?
5	A If they are serving there, that's the risk
6	you run serving outside your CCN.
7	Q Are you familiar with the water code
8	requirements for consideration of CCN amendment
9	applications?
10	A I am, as reflected in 291.
11	Q What's your understanding of where that is
12	reflected in 291?
13	A 291.102.
14	Q Can you turn to that section?
15	MR. RODRIGUEZ: Which version are we
16	turning to, Your Honor?
17	JUDGE NORMAN: Which version?
18	THE WITNESS: Can I get my book?
19	MR. RODRIGUEZ: Well, he had his book
20	out before.
21	THE WITNESS: No, that was my book.
22	MR. CARLTON: Oh, I'm sorry.
23	(Discussion off the record)
2 4	Q (BY MR. CARLTON) Let's start with the old
25	one.

1 A All right.

Q So 291.102(d), as it read prior to the filing of this application, states that the Commission shall consider "the effect of the granting of a certificate on any retail public utility of the same kind already serving the approximate area." Do you see that in (d)(3)?

A I do.

Q And so is it -- would the effect of eliminating those service connections from Lindsay Pure Water Company's ability to serve be an impact that the Commission has to consider in this case?

A They would.

Q And if that impact removed approximately one-third of Lindsay's existing customers, would you think that would be a significant impact?

A It could be.

Q Let's turn to the new rules, and would you look at (d)(3) in the new rules and let me know whether there is any difference in terms of what the Commission has to consider the impact on the existing retail public utility under those rules versus the old rules?

A They're very similar.

JUDGE NORMAN: Very similar with regard

to retail -- other retail public utilities. Correct? 1 2 As to the effect -- consideration of the 3 effect --JUDGE NORMAN: Right. 4 -- on the retail public entity --5 Α JUDGE NORMAN: Okay. 6 -- or service provider. 7 MR. CARLTON: There are differences, but 8 they are in other areas. 9 JUDGE NORMAN: Right. 10 And I'm assuming you were specifically 11 12 talking about that area? (BY MR. CARLTON) Yes, the retail public 13 0 14 utilities. Do you have any opinion about what the 15 cost would be to drill a well in this area to 16 17 successfully get potable water? Somewhere in the neighborhood -- and I'm 18 going to give you a change because those vary 19 obviously -- somewhere in the neighborhood of 350,000, 20 \$400,000. Now, that assumption is a municipal-type 21 well and not an individual house well. 22 Sure, and a well sufficient for providing 23 service to a retail public utility system? 24 JUDGE NORMAN: Correct? 25

1 (BY MR. CARLTON) Would that be a way to 2 describe that? 3 JUDGE NORMAN: Is that right, 4 Mr. Maroney? 5 I'm sorry. Yes, that's correct. 6 (BY MR. CARLTON) You testified on Page 10, 7 Lines 6, 7 and 8 about water wells becoming 8 inoperative. Do you see that testimony? 9 Α I do. 10 Do you have any evidence that you're relying 11 upon to determine that there has been some sort of frequency of water wells in the Lindsay area becoming 12 13 inoperative? 14 A T do. 15 And what is that? Q 16 Water wells are typically susceptible to 17 storms and to lightning, and I've done a number of 18 wells in the Lindsay area as it relates to Callisburg, 19 as it relates to Woodbine Water Supply Corporation. 20 have had in Cooke County south of Lindsay some wells 21 that get contaminated by saltwater injection wells. 22 So I have -- I have known of them becoming 23 inoperative, and they do become inoperative from time to time. 24

Where is Callisburg?

You said Callisburg.

1	A Callisburg is northeast, east of Gainesville
2	and north of 82.
3	Q So it's not particularly hydrologically
4	connected to the water in the Lindsay area?
5	A I'm sorry?
6	Q It's not hydrologically connected to the
7	water in the Lindsay area?
8	A That's not true.
9	Q Is it all part of the same aquifer?
10	A It is.
11	Q How far away is it?
12	A Seven or eight miles by the way the crow
13	flies.
14	Q So when you're talking about your experience
15	with wells in the Lindsay area, you're including a
16	pretty large radius around the town of Lindsay?
17	A I am.
18	JUDGE NORMAN: So just for the record,
19	seven or eight miles in a straight line. Is that
20	right?
21	A Yes, sir.
22	JUDGE NORMAN: Okay.
23	Q (BY MR. CARLTON) Would you turn to Page 12
24	of your testimony, Lines 20 and 21 and 22? You
25	indicate on those lines that "Lindsay Pure Water

Company does not have the legal authority to provide water service in Lindsay's proposed service territory." Do you see that?

A I do.

Q Are you familiar with the agency's rules that allow utility companies to provide service within a quarter mile of their existing CCN boundaries?

A I am.

Q So your statement that Lindsay doesn't have legal authority to provide service isn't exactly correct. What you probably meant to say is that Lindsay doesn't have -- Lindsay Pure Water doesn't have the CCN to provide service in that area?

A They don't have a CCN, and likely they did not file the proper paperwork in doing so.

Q What do you mean?

A Simply -- simply deciding to serve a quarter of a mile there's -- in addition to that, there's some writing, a map to be submitted to the Executive Director, and my assumption is -- and it's an assumption -- that that wasn't done.

Q You also point out that Lindsay hasn't filed an application to amend its current CCN. Is your understanding that Lindsay has, in order to protect a service area or an area in general from being

certificated that Lindsay has an obligation to file an amendment to its CCN?

A Filing a CCN does, in fact, give additional protection. It does give protection to Lindsay in that it not only obligates them, but it also gives them the right to serve a particular area.

Q But in protesting Lindsay's CCN application, is Lindsay Pure Water obligated to file a competing CCN amendment application?

A No.

Q Would you turn to Page 13 of your testimony?

And on Lines 8 through 18, you describe what you

consider to be a positive effect on the landowners in

the requested area. Do you see that?

A Yes, sir.

Q But you don't describe the fact that they would have to bear the costs of extending Lindsay's water system to serve their tracts, and that that cost might be more than extending service from Lindsay Pure Water Company, do you?

A I did not.

Q And, in fact, it would be a disadvantage to a landowner if they were forced to extend service from the town of Lindsay's system when they might be able to get it less expensively from Lindsay Pure Water

Company's system? 1 If cost is the only factor, that would be 2 Α 3 true. And I assume what you are also talking about 4 0 5 is reliability in terms of service, would be another -- would be the other factor? 6 7 Reliability would play a strong role in this, 8 yes, sir. 9 Do you have any information that suggests to you that Lindsay Pure Water company's system has 10 11 failed or wells gone down or anything along those 12 lines that would make you believe it to be an 13 unreliable system? Only they're not held to the same standard. 14 As you noted earlier in the requirements, TCEQ 15 requirements, they're only required to have one well 16 17 at this time. Lindsay is required to have two or 18 more. Okay. And that's because of the number of 19 2.0 connections. Correct? 21 Α Will be the number of connections, correct. Okay. And so even though Lindsay Pure Water 22 would be in compliance with TCEQ regulations under 23 minimum requirements, you would argue that they would 24

be a less reliable system because they have fewer

25

wells?

A That would be a factor.

Q Let's talk about the impact to the landowners who are currently getting service from Lindsay Pure Water Company if the CCN is granted to the town of Lindsay. Okay? Those individuals would be forced to obtain service from the town of Lindsay barring some agreement. Correct?

A Ask that question again.

A (Nodded)

Q If this CCN is granted as applied for to the town of Lindsay, those individuals would no longer be able to receive service from Lindsay Pure Water absent some agreement and would be forced to obtain service from the town of Lindsay. Correct?

 $$\operatorname{MR}.$$ RODRIGUEZ: I'll object to the extent that he's assuming facts that aren't in evidence, Your Honor.

JUDGE NORMAN: Well, make that assumption. Assume that Lindsay Pure Water Company is providing service to customers outside its CCN. Make that assumption and then see if you can answer that

question.

A Under that -- under your assumption and the assumption that Lindsay and Pure Water could not come to some agreement and Lindsay was adamant that they were going to require those people to get water from Lindsay, in fact they could drill their own well, for example. So there would be -- they would have an alternative, either be supplied by Lindsay or drill their own well or negotiate with -- you know, spur a negotiation between Lindsay and Pure Water, but that would be their options.

- $_{\mbox{\scriptsize Q}}$ (BY MR. CARLTON) How big of a lot do you need to drill a well?
- A It depends, but are you talking about a house well?
 - O Yes.
 - A Large enough to get a rig in, maybe 30 by 30.
- Q Are you familiar with whether any restrictions exist in Cooke County on the size of lots for water wells?
 - A I'm not familiar with that right now, no.
- Q Are you familiar with any deed restrictions that are in the South Ridge of Lindsay as far as drilling water wells on these sites?
 - A I am not.

Q So absent some of those limitations that might be imposed by Cooke County or the deed restrictions themselves, somebody could drill a well on their own lot, or they would have to pay to extend service from the town of Lindsay. Correct?

A Or negotiate with Lindsay.

Q Assume with me that they have to extend service from the town of Lindsay. What's going to be the impact on that landowner? How much is that going to cost for them to get service?

A Some of it depends on the action by the council. As they look at if, in fact, they are granted the CCN, then based on Mr. Metzler's testimony, there's the potential for the city council looking at this extension ordinance. And if it would be typical for what I see in other cities, based on my experience, there's a good possibility that the City of Lindsay would share that cost, depending on, in fact, what the demand is.

And so that water customer would, in fact, pay only on the capacity required. For example, if their capacity required a two-inch line, Lindsay might put a six, and they'll pay the difference between a two and a six. That remaining capacity would remain with the City of Lindsay and then get

prorated out as customers tie on.

Q Well, let's assume that Lindsay sticks with its ordinance and requires a six-inch line to be constructed out there and paid for by the service requester because that's what we have today, no changes yet. How much would the construction of a six-inch line cost to go from the north side of the Elm Fork of the Trinity to the South Ridge of Lindsay subdivision?

A That would be the \$18 a foot plus \$35,000 for crossing the river plus whatever -- based on whatever distance that is.

Q Now, you said there might also be some pressure facilities that would be needed in order to abut grade along this route. We're talking about the same route that we were talking about with the Hellinger property. Do you know what the elevation difference is between the two systems?

A Well, it varies between the two systems substantially.

(Exhibit LPWC Nos. 10 and 11 marked)

- Q (BY MR. CARLTON) Do you have a copy of what's been marked as LPWC-10 and LPWC-11?
 - A I do.
 - Q Would you take a look at 10 and see if you

1 Q What elevation is that at? 2 Α If it's where I think you're talking about, 3 it's been designated as 844. Okay. And would you follow 3108 south to 4 Q 5 where it intersects with another road, and do you see 6 the numbers 877? 7 А I do. 8 I'm going to represent to you that's 9 approximately the south boundary of the South Ridge at 10 Lindsay subdivision, and what's the elevation there? 11 Α 877. 12 So with the elevation of the South Ridge at 13 Lindsay subdivision and the elevation of the storage 14 tank in the town of Lindsay, would there be system 15 improvements necessary to provide additional elevated 16 storage or pumping to serve the South Ridge at Lindsay 17 subdivision? 18 And "the south" being the "877"? 19 Right, correct. The South Ridge at Lindsay 20 subdivision stretches from the 844 to the 877. 21 Α At the 877 elevation, there would be. 22 What sort of improvements would have to be 23 made? 24 You would either modify -- as I previously

said you could -- a couple of things. You could

25

modify Pump Station No. 1 that's in the part that's got -- not only does it pump to the elevated storage, but it's also got an existing abandoned pressure tank there that could be used then to repressure from Pump Station No. 1 into this 877 elevation for a period of time, depending on the demand.

Q And what would you anticipate the cost of those improvements to be?

A If would be basically the line work, converting the existing station -- one pump station to serve two pressure plains with the existing ground storage tanks already in place. And in addition to that with the pressure tank already in place, maybe another 25 or \$30,000 at Pump Station No. 1 and then the additional line work as we've previously described.

Q So given the 25 to \$30,000 of booster pump work and the \$35,000 to get under the creek and then the 100,000 or so for the construction of the six-inch line, that distance of about a mile, we're talking about 150 to \$200,000 worth of improvements to get service from the town of Lindsay to a connection in the South Ridge at Lindsay. Correct?

A Under the scenario you gave me, yes, sir.

Q What information would you need to know about

the Lindsay Pure Water Company system in order to determine its capacity?

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I would need to -- need to know the line Α sizes, distribution line sizes in general. I would need to know the height of -- if you're using a standpipe or an elevated storage, I'd need to know the height of that, I'd need to know the diameter of that. I'd need to know the pressure tank capacity. I'd need to know -- if you're using a pressure tank, two ways to do pressure maintenance, either elevated or pressure tank. I'd need to know the pumps with the pump curves that are being used for high service pumps, assuming you're not sizing just the well and elevated storage. I'd need to know the pump setting. I'd need to know -- if you've got a meter on the well, I'd need to know what that well can pump, the pump capacity of that well. That would be the majority of it.

Q So if Lindsay Pure Water Company has a hundred thousand gallon storage tank on site, how many connections would that serve?

- A It depends on what you use it for.
- Q If you're using it strictly for ground storage, total storage.
 - A If you're using it solely for ground storage,
