SUPPORT:

Eagle Falls Water Supply, LLC, applies to obtain a water CCN for 348 acres, a portion of which is/may be within LLWSSSC's area. The notice indicates there are no customers. This analysis will be concerned only with the financial and managerial evidence of ability of the principals of Eagle Falls to handle a CCN of 348 acres. It will not be concerned with whether they currently have a reliable source of water, whether the area overlaps LLWSSSC's area, or whether their negotiations with any other entity are ongoing or concluded.

The application included comprehensive cost estimates, along with detailed five-year projections of income and expense statements, and balance sheets for the utility, all prepared by the applicant's engineers, Water Engineers, Inc. The cost estimate for two phases totals \$826,067. The projected balance sheet shows it financed by equity from the two couples who are principals, Thomas and Carol Aikin, and Ryan and Kelli Aikin.

The application also included copies of personal balance sheets for the principals. The balance sheet for Thomas and Carol is dated August 20, 2009, and shows total

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determine the costs to connect to them. The results were estimated in four scenarios ranging from \$3.3 million to \$4.1 million, significantly higher than the estimated costs by the applicant's engineers to construct a standalone groundwater system. A later communication from TWSC decreased the estimated cost to \$2.6 million, still more than three times the cost estimate by the applicant's engineers. That figure does not include \$875/lot in "parity fee," required on each new lot, representing an "equalizing," of capital investment by new members with existing members, or another \$416,500. This option is not economically feasible for the applicant.

LLWSSC has requested a hearing concerning some portions of the requested area which apparently overlap LLWSSSC's area, which they declare would be dual-certification of that area which is presently LLWSSSC exclusive certification. The applicant contends they do not want any of LLWSSSC's area, and that LLWSSSC's map was incorrectly outlined, to which, of course, LLWSSSC does not agree. Negotiation and attempted settlement continues.
