RE: FRAUDULENT INFORMATION PROVIDED BY JAMES NELSON, OWNER OF WATERCO PUBLIC UTILITY COMMISSION HEARING ON OCTOBER 16, 2020

Dear Commission Staff,

James Nelson, owner of WATERCO has provided false information to the Public Utility Commissioners during his testimony in the public hearing held on October 16, 2020.

There are many false statements and several grave concerns I have however, in this first document I will provide documentation on the following statements made by James Nelson, owner of WATERCO.

- 1. PAGE 14 NELSON: I caught the attention of Public Utility Commission and TCEQ because I hooked up a lady temporarily. She filed a complaint that I didn't have a license to sell her water. She had no water. I was just being a good guy.
- 2. PAGE 15 NELSON: However, it did bring attention to WATERCO, which had been in operation for about 18-19 years, and I have been servicing a developer's group of folks that couldn't afford to put a water well. And so I allowed them I took over the community well, which at that time had 11 people.
- 3. PAGE 15 NELSON: I then Communicated and talked, called Abilene. And Jennelle Crane, investigator, came to my residence, which is Waterco, here in Nocona Lake Estates, and she looked at what I was doing. And the request that I made was that, if I opened a second well because there was a need for it on an undeveloped street —- it had no water out here in the estates, but it had about it's had several residents that and they all they needed water. They had no way of getting the water.
- 4. PAGE 15 & 16 NELSON: So, I activated a well and hooked up a second well, which had seven more people tied to it. So, I ended up, I believe, with about 18-19 people, if you added the wells together, but I was assured at that time that by having less than 15 per well that I was okay and wasn't a public water system. And I asked her to put that on paper, She did and sent me a memo stating just that.

James Nelson is an opportunistic liar and has taken this opportunity during the public hearing to once again, provide false information to one of the State of Texas's water regulating agencies.

1. PAGE 14 - NELSON: I caught the attention of Public Utility Commission and TCEQ because I hooked up a lady temporarily. She filed a complaint that I didn't have a license to sell her water. She had no water. I was just being a good guy.


Should you look closely, you will find that James Nelson even contradicts his previous submissions to PUC.

James Nelson shows here, he was not working incompliance with the PUC and TCEQ by waiting until he "caught the eye" of PUC and TCEQ due to the complaint I filed in July 2017. The stewardship of the public water service company here in Nocona Lake Estates is unlawful and Nelson has always and continues to this date to neglect his responsibilities as a public water service provider.

As I mentioned in the public hearing, the water service was connected to the property I purchased on January 6, 2017. I moved into the property a couple of weeks prior to the finalization of the sale. At this time I had water service. The property owner explained that he did not mess with the water guy, he just puts a 30 dollar check in his mail box. The owner showed me the mail box to place it in.

As you can see, there is no mention of this being a temporary connection..

James Nelson, owner of WATERCO utilities this experience with Jennelle Crane, TCEQ Investigator, intentionally to deceive the Public Utility Commission in the public hearing, just as he has used this experience to deceive the consumers of WATERCO, and the Commission Staff.

Here is the document in which Nelson presents as if it is an official document establishing WATERCO as an exempt status.




Today I investigated 2 wells that were reported to be used for Public Water System wells. The Owner of these wells is James Nelson. These wells are Reg iD 1517 and 1518. The GPS locations of these wells are as follows. Reg 10 1517 33° 50 785'N 97" 40 155W Reg ID 1518 33° 50.893'N 97° 40 101 W There is a septic tank that is 63 feet from the well head of well #1 These two wells are used to service people in the neighborhood. TCEQ visited the location on July 16, 2012 and determined that these wells are not Public Water Systems. They do not have enough customers. The wells are not tied together. One system has 11 customers and the other has 9 A copy of the TCEQ letter was submitted to the UTGCD Jennelle CARNE JENNFLLE CRANE


I requested the information in which Jennelle Crane issued this exempt status from Nubia Estrada, the current investigator at TCEQ working with WATERCO. She spoke to Jennelle and we found out Nelson's story is false. Jennelle Crane still works for TCEQ. The facts that were given to me indicated that Nelson did not disclose the second well. Jennelle investigated one well and one well only. The investigation is explained here in the TCEQ final investigation of WATERCO in which TCEQ reports the WATERCO well was not reported.


Photo of Statement regarding Jennelle Crane's 2012 Investigation. Page 2 of 4 - last paragraph.

During the pre-investigation of the complaint conducted on January 5 through January 31, 2018, Ms. Estrada noted that on July 26, 2012 Ms. Jennelle Crane had conducted an active/inactive FI of the Welco well (Keck Street well). The Waterco well was not mentioned in the investigation report. The investigation conducted on July 26, 2012 noted the Welco well to serve five residences on Keck Street. During the pre-investigation Ms. Estrada also obtained bacteriological chain of custody (COC) forms from the Wichita Falls-Wichita County Public Health

And I asked her to put that on paper, She did and sent me a memo stating just that.

Once again Nelson provides the Public Utility Commission with false information regarding the investigation done by TCEQ Investigator, Jennelle Crane.

The personal statements provided by James Nelson, owner of Waterco, documented in the transcript of the PUC Public hearing on October 16, 2020, were intentionally misleading in order to defraud the Public Utility Commission.

It is at this time I believe it is necessary for the Public Utility Commission to investigate the testimony of James Nelson, owner of WATERCO, by seeking input from Jennelle Crane with TCEQ.

I will continue to report the fraudulent testimony provided by Nelson in the upcoming docket submissions in the next 48 hours.
