(Crystal Systems) and Undine Texas, LLC (Undine) (collectively, the Applicants), together with the staff of the Public Utility Commission of Texas (Commission Staff) (collectively, the Parties), and file this Joint Motion to Admit Supplemental Evidence and Proposed Notice of Approval. In support thereof, the Parties show the following:

I. Background

On February 7, 2024, Applicants filed closing documents reflecting the consummation of Undine’s acquisition of Crystal Systems’ facilities and certificated service area. Staff filed its recommendation on February 22, 2024, recommending that the Applicants’ closing documentation be found sufficient. On February 27, 2024, the administrative law judge (ALJ) issued Order No. 24, establishing a deadline of April 15, 2024, for the Parties to file a Proposed Notice of Approval. Therefore, this pleading is timely filed.

II. Joint Motion to Admit Supplemental Evidence

The Parties respectfully request that the following documents be admitted into evidence in this proceeding:

- A. Undine’s Notice of Close of Transaction, filed on February 7, 2024;
- B. Commission Staff’s recommendation on sufficiency of closing documents, filed on February 27, 2024;
- C. Crystal Systems’ consent form, filed March 25, 2024 (AIS Item No. 443);
- D. Undine’s consent form, filed on April 1, 2024 (AIS Item No. 444); and
- E. The attached map, certificate, and tariff.

III. Proposed Notice of Approval

The parties move for adoption of the attached Proposed Notice of Approval. The undersigned counsel for Undine represents that Crystal Systems has authorized them to file this Joint Motion to Admit Evidence on Crystal Systems' behalf.

JOINT PROPOSED NOTICE OF APPROVAL

This Order addresses the application of Crystal Systems Texas, Inc. (Crystal Systems) and Undine Texas, LLC (Undine) (collectively, the Applicants), for the sale, transfer, or merger of facilities and certificate rights in Smith County. Applicants seek approval to sell and transfer all of Crystal Systems’ facilities and Crystal Systems’ water service area under its certificate of convenience and necessity (CCN) No. 10804 to Undine, the amendment of Undine’s CCN No. 13260 to include all facilities previously held by Crystal Systems and the service area previously included in Crystal Systems’ CCN No. 10804, and the cancellation of Crystal Systems’ CCN No. 10804. The administrative law judge (ALJ) grants that this sale is approved and the transaction between Applicants may proceed and be consummated.

I. Findings of Fact

The Commission makes the following findings of fact.

Applicant

1. Crystal Systems is a for-profit corporation registered with the Texas secretary of state under file number 0051759500.
2. Crystal Systems operates, maintains, and controls facilities for providing retail water service in Smith County under CCN number 10804.
3. Crystal Systems owns a public water system registered with the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) under identification number 2120015.
4. Undine is a Delaware corporation registered with the Texas secretary of state under filing number 802339329.
5. Undine Texas operates, maintains, and controls facilities for providing water service in multiple Texas counties under CCN No. 13260.
6. Undine owns multiple public water systems registered with the TCEQ.

Application

7. On July 1, 2022, Crystal Systems and Undine filed an application for the approval of the sale, transfer or merger of facilities and certificate rights in Smith County.
8. The applicants filed supplemental information on September 12, 14, 16, 21, and 22, October 6 and 31, November 9, and December 5, 2022; and January 23, March 23 and 24, April 26, and June 16 and 26, 2023.
9. In the application, as supplemented, the applicants seek approval of the following transaction:
 - a. The sale and transfer of Undine of the facilities and certificated area held under Crystal Systems' CCN number 10804;
 - b. The cancellation of Crystal Systems' CCN number 10804; and
 - c. The amendment of Undine's CCN number 13260 to include the facilities and area previously included in Crystal Systems' CCN number 10804.
10. The sale and transfer affect approximately 10,528 acres and 2,234 current customers in Smith County, Texas.
11. The requested area is located within and surrounding the City of Hideaway, Texas, and is generally bounded on the north by County Road 477 (John R. Bowdoin Road); on the east by County Road 411; on the south by County Road 46 (Old New Harmony Road); and on the west by County Road 411.
12. A portion of the service area of the CCN subject to this transaction falls within the initial rate jurisdiction of a municipality, Hideaway.
13. The Commission has initial rate jurisdiction in the service areas outside of Hideaway's municipal boundary, which includes approximately 2,000 connections.
14. In Order No. 7 filed on November 17, 2022, the ALJ found the application, as supplemented, administratively complete.

Notice

15. On December 5, 2022, Undine filed the affidavit of Carey A. Thomas, senior vice president for Undine, attesting that notice was mailed to all current customers, landowners, neighboring utilities, and affected parties on December 2, 2022.

16. On January 23, 2023, the applicants filed a publisher's affidavit attesting to the publication of notice in the *Tyler Morning Telegraph*, a newspaper of general circulation in Smith County, on November 23 and 30, 2022.
17. In Order No. 9 filed on February 15, 2023, the ALJ found notice sufficient.

Evidentiary Record

18. In Order No. 17, issued on September 8, 2023, the ALJ admitted the following evidence into the record of this proceeding:
 - a. The application and all attachments filed on July 1, 2022;
 - b. Undine's supplement to the application filed on September 12, 2022;
 - c. Undine's supplement to the application filed on September 14, 2022;
 - d. Undine's supplement to the application filed on September 16, 2022;

19. In Order No. 21, issued on December 21, 2023 the ALJ admitted the following evidence into the record:
 - a. The applicants' response to Order No. 18 filed on September 25, 2023;

- b. Commission Staff's response to Order No. 18 filed on October 17, 2023;
 - c. Commission Staff's response to Order No. 20 filed on November 29, 2023; and
 - d. Undine's response to Commission Staff's recommendation filed on November 30, 2023.
20. In Order No. ____, issued on _____, 2024 the ALJ admitted the following evidence into the record:
- a. Undine's Notice of Close of Transaction, filed on February 7, 2024;
 - b. Commission Staff's recommendation on sufficiency of closing documents, filed on February 27, 2024;
 - c. Crystal Systems' consent form, filed March 25, 2024;
 - d. Undine's consent form, filed on April 1, 2024; and
 - e. The attached map, certificate, and tariff.

Intervention

21. In Order No. 2 filed on August 1, 2022, the ALJ granted the Office of Public Utility Counsel's (OPUC) motion to intervene.

Sale

22. In Order No. 23 filed on December 21, 2023 the ALJ approved the sale and transaction to proceed and required Applicants to file proof that the transaction had closed, and customer deposits had been addressed.
23. On February 7, 2024, Applicants filed notice that the sale had closed on January 9, 2024, and confirmed that there were no outstanding customer deposits that needed to be addressed.
24. In Order No. 24 filed on February 27, 2024, the ALJ found the closing documents sufficient.

Purchaser's Compliance History

25. Undine has not been under an enforcement action by the Commission, TCEQ, Texas Health and Human Services, the Office of the Texas Attorney General, or the United States Environmental Protection Agency in the past five years for non-compliance with rules, orders, or state statutes.
26. On September 9, 2023, Undine confidentially filed updated information on its compliance history.

27. On November 29, 2023, Commission Staff recommended that Undine's updated compliance history did not change Commission Staff's recommendation on the purchase of Crystal Systems.
28. The Commission's complaint records, which date back five years, show no complaints against Undine.
29. Undine does not have a history of continuing mismanagement or misuse of revenues as a utility service provider.
30. Undine has demonstrated a compliance status that is adequate for approval of the transaction to proceed.

Adequacy of Existing Service

31. There are currently 2,234 connections in the 10,528-acre requested area that are being served by Crystal Systems through public water system number 2120015, and such service has been continuous and adequate.
32. The Commission's complaint records, which date back to 2017, show one complaint against Crystal Systems. The complaint has been closed by the Commission's Customer Protection Division.
33. Crystal Systems has no unresolved violations listed in the TCEQ database.
34. Capital improvements are not necessary for Undine to continue providing continuous and adequate service to the requested area.
35. There is no evidence in the record that Crystal Systems has failed to comply with any Commission or TCEQ order.

Need for Additional Service

36. There are 2,234 existing customer connections in the requested area that are receiving service from Crystal Systems and have an ongoing need for service.
37. This is an application to transfer only existing facilities, customer, and service area. There have been no specific requests for additional service within the requested area.

Effect of Approving the Transaction and Granting the Amendment

22. Undine will be the sole certificated water utility for the requested area.
23. Undine will be required to provide continuous and adequate water service to current and future customers in the requested areas.

24. There will be no effect on landowners as the requested area is currently certificated and served by Crystal Systems.
25. Because this application is to transfer only existing facilities, customers, and service area, there will be no effect on any other retail public utility servicing the proximate area.

Ability to Serve: Managerial and Technical

26. Undine owns and operates numerous TCEQ-registered public water systems in Texas.
27. Undine employs or contracts with TCEQ-licensed operators who will be responsible for operation of the public water systems being transferred.
28. No additional construction is necessary for Undine to serve the requested area.
29. Undine has the technical and managerial capability to provide continuous and adequate service to the requested area.

Ability to Serve: Financial Ability and Stability

30. Undine's affiliate, Undine Group, LLC, is capable, available and willing to cover temporary cash shortages, and has a debt-to-equity ratio of less than one, satisfying the leverage test.
31. Undine has sufficient cash available to cover all projected operations and maintenance shortages in the first five years of operations.
32. No capital improvements are necessary for Undine to continue providing continuous and adequate service to the requested area following the transaction.
33. Undine demonstrated has demonstrated the financial capability and stability to pay for the facilities necessary to provide continuous and adequate service to the requested area.

Financial Assurance

34. There is no need to require Undine to provide a bond or other financial assurance to ensure continuous and adequate service.

Feasibility of Obtaining Service from Adjacent Retail Public Utility

35. Crystal Systems is currently serving customers throughout the requested area and has sufficient capacity.
36. Obtaining service from an adjacent retail public utility would likely increase costs to customers because new facilities would need to be constructed; at a minimum, an interconnect would need to be installed to connect to a neighboring retail public utility.
37. It is not feasible to obtain service from an adjacent retail public utility.

Regionalization or Consolidation

38. It will not be necessary for Undine Texas to construct a physically separate water system to serve the requested area.
39. Because the requested area will not require the construction of a physically separate water system, consideration of regionalization or consolidation with another retail public utility is not required.

Environmental Integrity and Effect on the Land

40. There will be no effect on environmental integrity or the land as a result of the transaction as the requested area will continue to be served by existing facilities.

Improvement of Service or Lowering Cost to Consumers

41. Undine will continue to provide water service to Crystal Systems' existing customers in the requested area.
42. Reliability and quality of water service is expected to improve under Undine's management.
43. Undine Texas requested authorization to charge the customers served by the public water system being acquired its rates that are currently in force, which were approved in Docket No. 50017.¹
44. If authorization is granted, rates for customers in the requested area will be higher than the rates currently charged by Crystal Systems because Undine will charge its current water utility tariffs rates that are currently in force.

II. Conclusions of Law

The Commission makes the following conclusions of law.

1. The Commission has authority over this proceeding under Texas Water Code (TWC) §§ 13.041,13.241,13.242,13.244,13.246,13.251, and 13.301.
2. Undine and Crystal Systems are retail public utilities as defined by TWC § 13.002(19) and 16 TAC § 24.3(31).
3. Undine and Crystal Spring's application meets the requirements of TWC § 13.244 and 16 TAC §§ 24.227 and 24.233.

4. Undine and Crystal Systems provided notice of the application that complies with TWC §§ 13.246 and 13.301(a)(2) and 16 TAC §§ 24.235 and 24.239(a)-(c).²
5. The Commission processed this application as required by the TWC, the Administrative Procedure Act,³ and Commission rules.
6. Undine and Crystal Springs have complied with the requirements of 16 TAC § 24.239(k) and (l) with respect to customer deposits.
7. Undine and Crystal Systems completed the sale and transfer within the time required by 16 TAC § 24.239(m).
8. After consideration of the factors in TWC § 13.246(c), Undine has demonstrated adequate financial, managerial, and technical capability for providing adequate and continuous service to the requested area, as required by TWC § 13.251.
9. Undine demonstrated adequate financial, managerial, and technical capability for providing continuous and adequate service in the requested areas as required by TWC §§ 13.241(a) and 13.301(b).
10. It is not necessary for Undine to provide bond or other financial assurance under TWC §§ 13.246(d) and 13.301(c).
11. Regionalization and consolidation concerns under TWC § 13.241(d) do not apply in this proceeding because construction of a physically separate water or sewer system is not required.
12. Undine has demonstrated that the sale and transfer of Crystal Systems' water facilities and service area held under CCN number 10804 to Undine will serve the public interest and is necessary for the service, accommodation, convenience, and safety of the public as required by TWC §§ 13.246(b) and 13.301(d) and (e).
13. Undine has demonstrated that the amendment of its certificates of convenience and necessity will serve the public interest and is necessary for the service, accommodation, convenience, or safety of the public. TWC §§ 13.301(d), 13.246(b).
14. Under TWC § 13.257(r) and (s), Undine must record a certified copy of the certificates approved by this Notice of Approval, in the real property records of Smith County within

31 days of receiving this Notice of Approval and submit to the Commission evidence of the recording.

15. The requirements for informal disposition under 16 TAC § 22.35 have been met in this proceeding.

III. Ordering Paragraphs

In accordance with these findings of fact and conclusions of law, the Commission issues the following orders:

1. The Commission approves the sale and transfer of all of Crystal Systems' water facilities and service area held under water CCN number 10804 to Undine, as shown on the attached map.
2. The Commission amends Undine's CCN number 13260 to include the areas previously included in Crystal Springs' CCN number 10804.
3. The Commission cancels Crystal Springs' CCN number 10804.
4. The Commission approves the map and tariff attached to this Notice of Approval.
5. The Commission issues the certificate attached to this Notice of Approval.
6. Undine must provide service to every customer or applicant for service within the approved area under water CCN 13260 that requests service and meets the terms of Undine's water service, and such service must be continuous and adequate.
7. Undine must comply with the recording requirements in TWC § 13.257(r) and (s) for the area in Smith County affected by the application and must submit to the Commission evidence of the recording no later than 45 days after receipt of the Notice of Approval.
8. Within ten days of the date of the Notice of Approval, Commission Staff must provide a clean copy of the tariff approved by this Notice of Approval to central records to be marked *Approved* and filed in the Commission's tariff books.
9. The Commission denies all other motions and any other requests for general or specific relief, if not expressly granted.

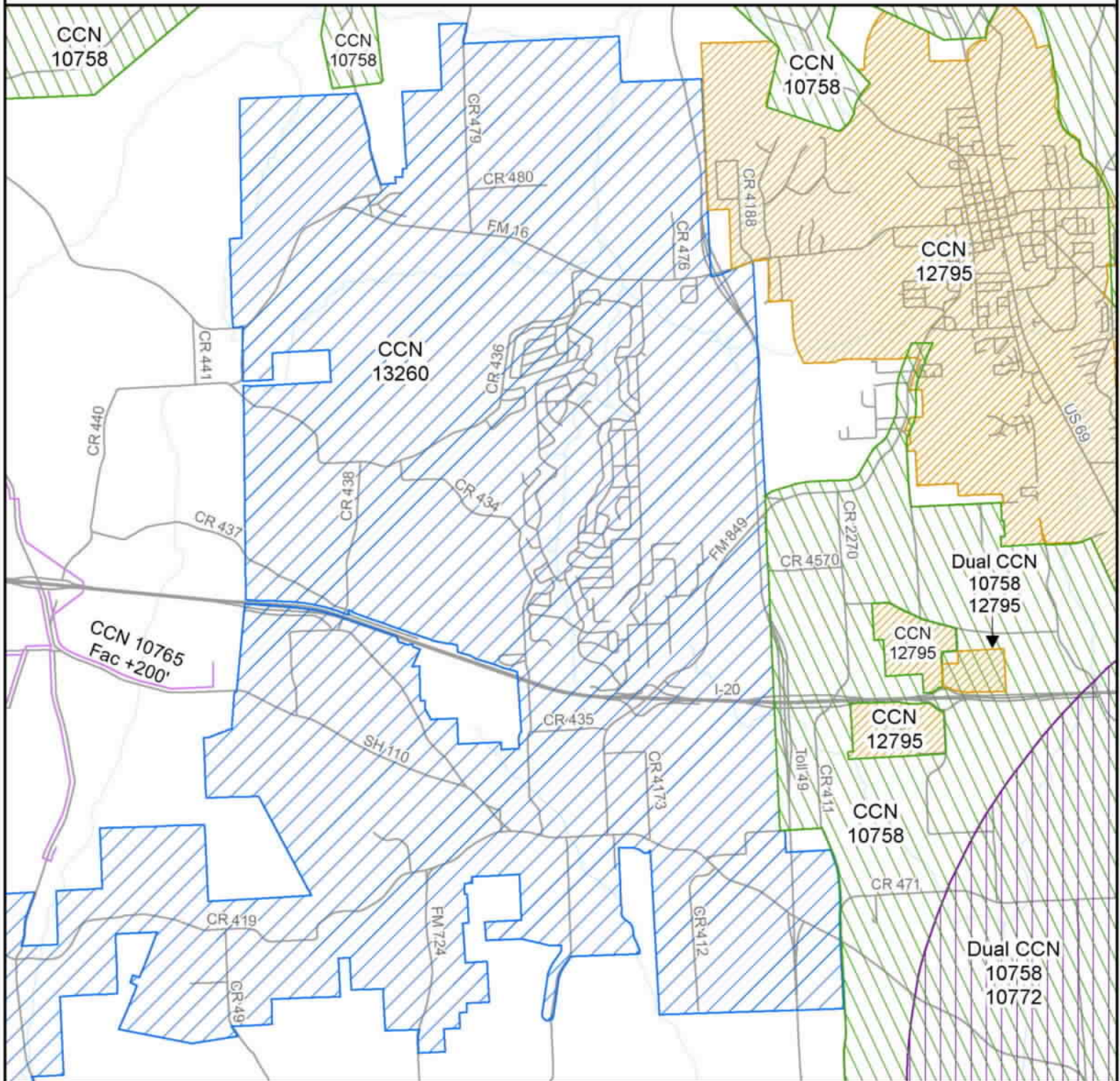

SECTION 2.0 – SERVICE RULES AND POLICIES

The utility will have the most current Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUC) Rules, Chapter 24, available at its office for reference purposes. The Rules and this tariff shall be available for public inspection and reproduction at a reasonable cost. The latest Rules or Commission approved changes to the Rules supersede any rules or requirements in this tariff.

Section 2.01 - Application for Water Service

All applications for service will be made on the utility's standard application or contract form (attached in the Appendix to this tariff), will be signed by the applicant, any required fees (deposits, reconnect, tap, extension fees, etc. as applicable) will be paid and easements, if required, will be granted before service is provided by the utility. A separate application or contract will be made for each service location.

Section 2.02 - Refusal of Service

The utility may decline to serve an applicant until the applicant has complied with the regulations of the regulatory agencies (state and municipal regulations) and for the reasons outlined in the PUC Rules. In the event that the utility refuses to serve an applicant, the utility will inform the applicant in writing of the basis of its refusal. The utility is also required to inform the applicant that a complaint may be filed with the Commission.

Section 2.03 - Fees and Charges & Easements Required Before Service Can Be Connected

(A) Customer Deposits

If a residential applicant cannot establish credit to the satisfaction of the utility, the applicant may be required to pay a deposit as provided for in Section 1.02 - Miscellaneous Fees of this tariff. The utility will keep records of the deposit and credit interest in accordance with PUC Rules.

Residential applicants 65 years of age or older may not be required to pay deposits unless the applicant has an outstanding account balance with the utility or another water or sewer utility which accrued within the last two years.

Nonresidential applicants who cannot establish credit to the satisfaction of the utility may be required to make a deposit that does not exceed an amount equivalent to one-sixth of the estimated annual billings.

Refund of deposit - If service is not connected, or after disconnection of service, the utility will promptly refund the customer's deposit plus accrued interest or the balance, if any, in excess of the unpaid bills for service furnished. The utility may refund the deposit at any time prior to termination of utility service but must refund the deposit plus interest for any residential customer who has paid 18 consecutive billings without being delinquent.

(B) Tap or Reconnect Fees

A new customer requesting service at a location where service has not previously been provided must pay a tap fee as provided in Section 1. A customer requesting service where service has previously been provided must pay a reconnect fee as provided in Section 1.

SECTION 2.0 – SERVICE RULES AND POLICIES (Continued)

Any applicant or existing customer required to pay for any costs not specifically set forth in the rate schedule pages of this tariff shall be given a written explanation of such costs prior to request for payment and/or commencement of construction. If the applicant or existing customer does not believe that these costs are reasonable or necessary, the applicant or existing customer shall be informed of their right to appeal such costs to the PUC or such other regulatory authority having jurisdiction over the utility's rates in that portion of the utility's service area in which the applicant's or existing customer's property(ies) is located.

Fees in addition to the regular tap fee may be charged if listed specifically in Section 1 to cover unique costs not normally incurred as permitted by 16 TAC § 24.163(a)(1)(C). For example, a road bore for customers outside a subdivision or residential area could be considered a unique cost.

(C) Easement Requirement

Where recorded public utility easements on the service applicant's property do not exist or public road right-of-way easements are not available to access the applicant's property, the Utility may require the applicant to provide it with a permanent recorded public utility easement on and across the applicant's real property sufficient to provide service to that applicant. Such easement(s) shall not be used for the construction of production, storage, transmission or pressure facilities unless they are needed for adequate service to that applicant.

Section 2.04 - Utility Response to Applications for Service

After the applicant has met all the requirements, conditions and regulations for service, the utility will install tap, meter and utility cut-off valve and/or take all necessary actions to initiate service. The utility will serve each qualified applicant for service within 5 working days unless line extensions or new facilities are required. If construction is required to fill the order and if it cannot be completed within 30 days, the utility will provide the applicant with a written explanation of the construction required and an expected date of service.

Except for good cause where service has previously been provided, service will be reconnected within one working day after the applicant has met the requirements for reconnection.

Section 2.05 - Customer Responsibility

The customer will be responsible for furnishing and laying the necessary customer service pipe from the meter location to the place of consumption. Customers will not be allowed to use the utility's cutoff valve on the utility's side of the meter. Existing customers may install cutoff valves on their side of the meter and are encouraged to do so. All new customers may be required to install and maintain a cutoff valve on their side of the meter.

No direct connection between a public water supply system and any potential source of contamination or between a public water supply system and a private water source (ex. private well) will be allowed. A customer shall not connect, or allow any other person or party to connect, onto any water lines on his premises.

SECTION 2.0 – SERVICE RULES AND POLICIES (Continued)

Section 2.06 - Customer Service Inspections

Applicants for new service connections or facilities which have undergone extensive plumbing modifications are required to furnish the utility a completed customer service inspection certificate. The inspection certificate shall certify that the establishment is in compliance with the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) Rules and Regulations for Public Water Systems, 30 TAC § 290.46(j). The Utility is not required to perform these inspections for the applicant/customer, but will assist the applicant/customer in locating and obtaining the services of a certified inspector.

Section 2.07 - Back Flow Prevention Devices

All non-residential customers requiring a greater than 1” meter or any customer with irrigation or firefighting systems, must install back flow prevention devices which have been approved by the utility or its consulting engineers on each of their customer service lines.

The back flow assembly shall be tested upon installation by a recognized prevention assembly tester and certified to be operation within specifications. Back flow prevention assemblies which are installed to provide protection against high health hazards must be tested and certified to be operating within specifications at least annually by a recognized back flow prevention device tester. The maintenance and testing of the back flow assembly shall occur at the customer’s expense.

No water connection shall be made to any establishment where an actual or potential contamination or system hazard exists without an approved air gap or mechanical backflow prevention assembly. The air gap or back flow assembly shall be installed in accordance with the American Water works Association (AWWA) standards C510, C511 and AWWA Manual M14 or the University of Southern California Manual of Cross-Connection Control, current edition. The back flow assembly installation by a licensed plumber shall occur at the customer’s expense.

Section 2.08 - Access to Customer’s Premises

The utility will have the right of access to the customer's premises at all reasonable times for the purpose of installing, testing, inspecting or repairing water mains or other equipment used in connection with its provision of water service, or for the purpose of removing its property and disconnecting lines, and for all other purposes necessary to the operation of the utility system including inspecting the customer's plumbing for code, plumbing or tariff violations. The customer shall allow the utility and its personnel access to the customer's property to conduct any water quality tests or inspections required by law. Unless necessary to respond to equipment failure, leak or other condition creating an immediate threat to public health and safety or the continued provision of adequate utility service to others, such entry upon the customer's property shall be during normal business hours and the utility personnel will attempt to notify the customer that they will be working on the customer’s property. The customer may require any utility representative, employee, contractor, or agent seeking to make such entry identify themselves, their affiliation with the utility, and the purpose of their entry.

SECTION 2.0 – SERVICE RULES AND POLICIES (Continued)

All customers or service applicants shall provide access to meters and utility cutoff valves at all times reasonably necessary to conduct ordinary utility business and after normal business hours as needed to protect and preserve the integrity of the public drinking water supply.

Section 2.09 – Meter Requirements, Readings, and Testing

One meter is required for each residential, commercial, or industrial connection. All water sold by the utility will be billed based on meter measurements. The utility will provide, install, own and maintain meters to measure amounts of water consumed by its customers.

Meters will be read at monthly intervals and as nearly as possible on the corresponding day of each monthly meter reading period unless otherwise authorized by the Commission.

Meter tests. – The utility will, upon the request of a customer, and, if the customer so desires, in his or her presence or in that of his or her authorized representative, make without charge a test of the accuracy of the customer's meter. If the customer asks to observe the test, the test will be made during the utility's normal working hours at a time convenient to the customer. Whenever possible, the test will be made on the customer's premises, but may, at the utility's discretion, be made at the utility's testing facility. If within a period of two years the customer requests a new test, the utility will make the test, but if the meter is found to be within the accuracy standards established by the American Water Works Association, the utility will charge the customer a fee which reflects the cost to test the meter up to a maximum \$25 for a residential customer. Following the completion of any requested test, the utility will promptly advise the customer of the date of removal of the meter, the date of the test, the result of the test, and who made the test.

Section 2.10 – Billing

(A) Regular Billing

Bills from the utility will be mailed monthly unless otherwise authorized by the Commission. The due date of bills for utility service will be at least sixteen (16) days from the date of issuance. The postmark on the bill or, if there is no postmark on the bill, the recorded date of mailing by the utility will constitute proof of the date of issuance. Payment for utility service is delinquent if full payment, including late fees and the regulatory assessment, is not received at the utility or the utility's authorized payment agency by 5:00 p.m. on the due date. If the due date falls on a holiday or weekend, the due date for payment purposes will be the next workday after the due date.

(B) Late Fees

A late penalty of either \$5.00 or 10.0% will be charged on bills received after the due date. The penalty on delinquent bills will not be applied to any balance to which the penalty was applied in a previous billing. The utility must maintain a record of the date of mailing to charge the late penalty.

(C) Information on Bill

Each bill will provide all information required by the PUC Rules. For each of the systems it operates, the utility will maintain and note on the monthly bill a local or toll-free telephone number (or numbers) to which customers can direct questions about their utility service.

SECTION 2.0 – SERVICE RULES AND POLICIES (Continued)

(D) Prorated Bills

If service is interrupted or seriously impaired for 24 consecutive hours or more, the utility will prorate the monthly base bill in proportion to the time service was not available to reflect this loss of service.

Section 2.11- Payments

All payments for utility service shall be delivered or mailed to the utility's business office. If the business office fails to receive payment prior to the time of noticed disconnection for non-payment of a delinquent account, service will be terminated as scheduled. Utility service crews shall not be allowed to collect payments on customer accounts in the field.

Payment of an account by any means that has been dishonored and returned by the payor or payee's bank, shall be deemed to be delinquent. All returned payments must be redeemed with cash or valid money order. If a customer has two returned payments within a twelve month period, the customer shall be required to pay a deposit if one has not already been paid.

Section 2.12 - Service Disconnection

(A) With Notice

Utility service may be disconnected if the bill has not been paid in full by the date listed on the termination notice. The termination date must be at least 10 days after the notice is mailed or hand delivered.

The utility is encouraged to offer a deferred payment plan to a customer who cannot pay an outstanding bill in full and is willing to pay the balance in reasonable installments. However, a customer's utility service may be disconnected if a bill has not been paid or a deferred payment agreement entered into within 26 days from the date of issuance of a bill and if proper notice of termination has been given.

Notice of termination must be a separate mailing or hand delivery in accordance with the PUC Rules.

B) Without Notice

Utility service may also be disconnected without notice for reasons as described in the PUC Rules.

Section 2.13 - Reconnection of Service

Utility personnel must be available during normal business hours to accept payments on the day service is disconnected and the following day unless service was disconnected at the customer's request or due to a hazardous condition.

Service will be reconnected within 36 hours after the past due bill, reconnect fees and any other outstanding charges are paid or the conditions which caused service to be disconnected are corrected.

SECTION 2.0 – SERVICE RULES AND POLICIES (Continued)

Section 2.14 - Service Interruptions

The utility will make all reasonable efforts to prevent interruptions of service. If interruptions occur, the utility will re-establish service within the shortest possible time. Except for momentary interruptions due to automatic equipment operations, the utility will keep a complete record of all interruptions, both emergency and scheduled and will notify the Commission in writing of any service interruptions affecting the entire system or any major division of the system lasting more than four hours. The notice will explain the cause of the interruptions.

Section 2.15 - Quality of Service

The utility will plan, furnish, and maintain production, treatment, storage, transmission, and distribution facilities of sufficient size and capacity to provide a continuous and adequate supply of water for all reasonable consumer uses. Unless otherwise authorized by the Commission, the utility will maintain facilities as described in the TCEQ Rules and Regulations for Public Water Systems.

Section 2.16 - Customer Complaints and Disputes

If a customer or applicant for service lodges a complaint, the utility will promptly make a suitable investigation and advise the complainant of the results. Service will not be disconnected pending completion of the investigation. If the complainant is dissatisfied with the utility's response, the utility must advise the complainant that he has recourse through the PUC complaint process. Pending resolution of a complaint, the commission may require continuation or restoration of service.

The utility will maintain a record of all complaints which shows the name and address of the complainant, the date and nature of the complaint and the adjustment or disposition thereof, for a period of two years after the final settlement of the complaint.

In the event of a dispute between a customer and a utility regarding any bill for utility service, the utility will conduct an investigation and report the results to the customer. If the dispute is not resolved, the utility will inform the customer that a complaint may be filed with the Commission.

Section 2.17 - Customer Liability

Customer shall be liable for any damage or injury to utility-owned property shown to be caused by the customer.

SECTION 3.0 – EXTENSION POLICY

Section 3.01 - Standard Extension Requirements

Line Extension and Construction Charges: No Contribution in Aid of Construction may be required of any customer except as provided for in this approved extension policy.

The customer will be given an itemized statement of the costs, options such as rebates to the customer, sharing of construction costs between the utility and the customer, or sharing of costs between the customer and other applicants prior to beginning construction.

Unless an exception is granted by the PUC, the residential service applicant shall not be required to pay for costs of main extensions greater than 2" in diameter for water distribution and pressure wastewater collection lines and 6" in diameter for gravity wastewater lines.

Exceptions may be granted by the PUC if:

- adequate service cannot be provided to the applicant using the maximum line sizes listed due to distance or elevation, in which case, it shall be the utility's burden to justify that a larger diameter pipe is required for adequate service;
- or larger minimum line sizes are required under subdivision platting requirements or building codes of municipalities within whose corporate limits or extraterritorial jurisdiction the point of use is located; or the residential service applicant is located outside the CCN service area.

If an exception is granted, the Utility shall establish a proportional cost plan for the specific extension or a rebate plan which may be limited to seven years to return the portion of the applicant's costs for oversizing as new customers are added to ensure that future applicants for service on the line pay at least as much as the initial service applicant.

The utility shall bear the cost of any over-sizing of water distribution lines or waste water collection lines necessary to serve other potential service applicants in the immediate area.

For purposes of determining the costs that service applicants shall pay, commercial customers with service demands greater than residential customer demands in the certified area, industrial, and wholesale customers shall be treated as developers. A service applicant requesting a one inch meter for a lawn sprinkler system to service a residential lot is not considered nonstandard service.

If an applicant requires service other than the standard service provided by the utility, such applicant will be required to pay all expenses incurred by the utility in excess of the expenses that would be incurred in providing the standard service and connection beyond 200 feet and throughout his property including the cost of all necessary transmission facilities.

Residential customers will be charged the equivalent of the costs of extending service to their property from the nearest transmission or distribution line even if that line does not have adequate capacity to serve the customer. However, if the customer places unique, non-standard service demands upon the system, the customer may be charged the additional cost of extending service to and throughout their property, including the cost of all necessary transmission and storage facilities necessary to meet the service demands anticipated to be created by that property.

SECTION 3.0 – EXTENSION POLICY (Continued)

Section 3.02 - Costs Utilities Shall Bear

The utility will bear the full cost of any oversizing of water mains necessary to serve other customers in the immediate area. The individual residential customer shall not be charged for any additional production, storage, or treatment facilities. Contributions in aid of construction may not be required of individual residential customers for production, storage, treatment or transmission facilities unless otherwise approved by the Commission under this specific extension policy.

Within its certified area, the utility will pay the cost of the first 200 feet of any water main or distribution line necessary to extend service to an individual residential customer within a platted subdivision. However, if the residential customer requesting service purchased the property after the developer was notified in writing of the need to provide facilities to the utility, the utility may charge for the first 200 feet. The utility must also be able to document that the developer of the subdivision refused to provide facilities compatible with the utility's facilities in accordance with the utility's approved extension policy after receiving a written request from the utility.

The Utility is not required to extend service to any applicant outside of its certified service area and will only do so under terms and conditions mutually agreeable to the Utility and the applicant, in compliance with PUC rules and policies, and upon extension of the Utility's certified service area boundaries by the PUC.

Section 3.03 - Contributions in Aid of Construction

Developers may be required to provide contributions in aid of construction in amounts sufficient to furnish the development with all facilities necessary to provide for reasonable local demand requirements and to comply with TCEQ minimum design criteria for facilities used in the production, transmission, pumping, or treatment of water or TCEQ minimum requirements. For purposes of this subsection, a developer is one who subdivides or requests more than two meters on a piece of property. Commercial, industrial, and wholesale customers will be treated as developers.

Any applicant who places unique or non-standard service demands on the system may be required to provide contributions in aid of construction for the actual costs of any additional facilities required to maintain compliance with the TCEQ minimum design criteria for water production, treatment, pumping, storage and transmission.

Any service extension to a subdivision (recorded or unrecorded) may be subject to the provisions and restrictions of 16 TAC § 24.163(d). When a developer wishes to extend the system to prepare to service multiple new connections, the charge shall be the cost of such extension, plus a pro-rata charge for facilities which must be committed to such extension compliant with the TCEQ minimum design criteria. As provided by 16 TAC § 24.163(d)(3), for purposes of this section, commercial, industrial, and wholesale customers shall be treated as developers

SECTION 3.0 – EXTENSION POLICY (Continued)

Section 3.02 - Costs Utilities Shall Bear

The utility will bear the full cost of any oversizing of water mains necessary to serve other customers in the immediate area. The individual residential customer shall not be charged for any additional production, storage, or treatment facilities. Contributions in aid of construction may not be required of individual residential customers for production, storage, treatment or transmission facilities unless otherwise approved by the Commission under this specific extension policy.

Within its certified area, the utility will pay the cost of the first 200 feet of any water main or distribution line necessary to extend service to an individual residential customer within a platted subdivision. However, if the residential customer requesting service purchased the property after the developer was notified in writing of the need to provide facilities to the utility, the utility may charge for the first 200 feet. The utility must also be able to document that the developer of the subdivision refused to provide facilities compatible with the utility's facilities in accordance with the utility's approved extension policy after receiving a written request from the utility.

The Utility is not required to extend service to any applicant outside of its certified service area and will only do so under terms and conditions mutually agreeable to the Utility and the applicant, in compliance with PUC rules and policies, and upon extension of the Utility's certified service area boundaries by the PUC.

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Any applicant who places unique or non-standard service demands on the system may be required to provide contributions in aid of construction for the actual costs of any additional facilities required to maintain compliance with the TCEQ minimum design criteria for water production, treatment, pumping, storage and transmission.

Any service extension to a subdivision (recorded or unrecorded) may be subject to the provisions and restrictions of 16 TAC § 24.163(d). When a developer wishes to extend the system to prepare to service multiple new connections, the charge shall be the cost of such extension, plus a pro-rata charge for facilities which must be committed to such extension compliant with the TCEQ minimum design criteria. As provided by 16 TAC § 24.163(d)(3), for purposes of this section, commercial, industrial, and wholesale customers shall be treated as developers.

SECTION 3.0 – EXTENSION POLICY (Continued)

A utility may only charge a developer standby fee for unrecovered costs of facilities committed to a developer's property under the following circumstances:

- Under a contract and only in accordance with the terms of the contract; or
- if service is not being provided to a lot or lots within two years after installation of facilities necessary to provide service to the lots has been completed and if the standby fees are included on the utility's approved tariff after a rate change application has been filed. The fees cannot be billed to the developer or collected until the standby fees have been approved by the commission or executive director.
- For purposes of this section, a manufactured housing rental community can only be charged standby fees under a contract or if the utility installs the facilities necessary to provide individually metered service to each of the rental lots or spaces in the community.

Section 3.04 - Appealing Connection Costs

The imposition of additional extension costs or charges as provided by Sections 3.0 - Extension Policy of this tariff shall be subject to appeal as provided in this tariff, PUC rules, or the rules of such other regulatory authority as may have jurisdiction over the utility's rates and services. Any applicant required to pay for any costs not specifically set forth in the rate schedule pages of this tariff shall be given a written explanation of such costs prior to payment and/or commencement of construction. If the applicant does not believe that these costs are reasonable or necessary, the applicant shall be informed of the right to appeal such costs to the PUC or such other regulatory authority having jurisdiction over the utility's rates in that portion of the utility's service area in which the applicant's property(ies) is located.

Section 3.05 - Applying for Service

The Utility will provide a written service application form to the applicant for each request for service received by the Utility's business offices. A separate application shall be required for each potential service location if more than one service connection is desired by any individual applicant.

Service application forms will be available at the Utility's business office during normal weekday business hours. Service applications will be sent by prepaid first class United States mail to the address provided by the applicant upon request. Completed applications should be returned by hand delivery in case there are questions which might delay fulfilling the service request. Completed service applications may be submitted by mail if hand delivery is not possible.

Where a new tap or service connection is required, the service applicant shall be required to submit a written service application and request that a tap be made. A diagram, map, plat, or written metes and bounds description of precisely where the applicant desires each tap or service connection is to be made and, if necessary, where the meter is to be installed, along the applicant's property line may also be required with the tap request. The actual point of connection and meter installation must be readily accessible to Utility personnel for inspection, servicing, and meter reading while being reasonably secure from damage by vehicles and mowers.

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SECTION 3.0 – EXTENSION POLICY (Continued)

If the Utility has more than one main adjacent to the service applicant's property, the tap or service connection will be made to the Utility's nearest service main with adequate capacity to service the applicant's full potential service demand. Beyond the initial 200 feet, the customer shall bear only the equivalent cost of extending from the nearest main. If the tap or service connection cannot be made at the applicant's desired location, it will be made at another location mutually acceptable to the applicant and the Utility. If no agreement on location can be made, the applicant may refer the matter to the PUC for resolution.

Section 3.06 - Qualified Service Applicant

A “qualified service applicant” is an applicant who has: (1) met all of the Utility's requirements for service contained in this tariff, PUC rules and/or PUC order, (2) has made payment or made arrangement for payment of tap fees, (3) has provided all easements and rights-of-way required to provide service to the requested location, (4) delivered an executed customer service inspection certificate to the Utility, if applicable, and (5) has executed a customer service application for each location to which service is being requested.

The Utility shall serve each qualified service applicant within its certified service area as soon as practical after receiving a completed service application. All service requests will be fulfilled within the time limits prescribed by PUC rules once the applicant has met all conditions precedent to achieving “qualified service applicant” status. If a service request cannot be fulfilled within the required period, the applicant shall be notified in writing of the delay, its cause and the anticipated date that service will be available. The PUC service dates shall not become applicable until the service applicant has met all conditions precedent to becoming a qualified service applicant as defined by PUC rules.

Section 3.07 - Developer Requirements

As a condition of service to a new subdivision, the Utility shall require a developer (as defined by PUC rule) to provide permanent recorded public utility easements as a condition of service to any location within the developer’s property.

SECTION I: DECLARATION OF POLICY, PURPOSE, AND INTENT

In order to conserve the available water supply and protect the integrity of water supply facilities, with particular regard for domestic water use and sanitation, and to protect and preserve public health, welfare, and safety and minimize the adverse impacts of water supply shortage or other water supply emergency conditions, the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality ("TCEQ") requires that water utilities develop drought contingency plans (see TCEQ rules at Title 30, Part 1, Chapter 288, Subchapter B, Rule 288.20, attached as Appendix A). Undine Texas, LLC ("Undine") hereby adopts the following Drought Contingency Plan ("Plan") setting out the regulations and restrictions on the delivery and consumption of water provided to its customers.

SECTION II: APPLICATION

The provisions of this Plan apply to all persons, customers, and property utilizing water provided by Undine in accordance with Undine's Tariff. The terms "person" and "customer" as used in the Plan include individuals, corporations, partnerships, associations, and all other legal entities.

SECTION III: PUBLIC INVOLVEMENT

Undine afforded the public an opportunity to provide input into the Plan by notifying its customers, via customers' bills, of the opportunity to review and comment on the Plan. Undine took those comments into account in developing the final Plan.

SECTION IV: PUBLIC EDUCATION

Undine will periodically provide its customers with information about the Plan, including information about the conditions under which each stage of the Plan is to be initiated or terminated and the drought response measures to be implemented in each stage. Undine will provide this information through customer billing inserts, direct mail notices, subdivision sign postings, and/or posting on Undine's website.

SECTION V: COORDINATION WITH REGIONAL WATER PLANNING GROUP

Pursuant to TCEQ's rules, Undine has provided a copy of the Plan to each of the applicable regional water planning groups for Undine's service areas. Undine will provide a copy of the Plan to any new regional water planning groups for any new system(s) added to Undine's tariff.

SECTION VI: DEFINITIONS

The following definitions apply to this Plan:

Aesthetic water use: water use for ornamental or decorative purposes such as fountains, reflecting pools, and water gardens.

Commercial and institutional water use: water use which is integral to the operations of commercial and non-profit establishments and governmental entities such as retail establishments, hotels and motels, restaurants, and office buildings.

Conservation: those practices, techniques, and technologies that reduce the consumption of water, reduce the loss or waste of water, improve the efficiency in the use of water or increase the recycling and reuse of water so that a supply is conserved and made available for future or alternative uses.

Customer: any person, company, or organization using water supplied by Undine.

Domestic water use: water use for personal needs or for household or sanitary purposes such as drinking, bathing, heating, cooking, sanitation, or for cleaning a residence, business, industry, or institution.

Even number address: street addresses, box numbers, or rural postal route numbers ending in 0, 2, 4, 6, or 8 and locations without addresses.

Industrial water use: the use of water in processes designed to convert materials of lower value into forms having greater usability and value.

Landscape irrigation use: water used for the irrigation and maintenance of landscaped areas, whether publicly or privately owned, including residential and commercial lawns, gardens, golf courses, parks, and rights-of-way and medians.

Non-essential water use: water uses that are not essential nor required for the protection of public, health, safety, and welfare, including:

- (a) irrigation of landscape areas, including parks, athletic fields, and golf courses, except otherwise provided under this Plan;
- (b) use of water to wash any motor vehicle, motorbike, boat, trailer, airplane or other vehicle;
- (c) use of water to wash down any sidewalks, walkways, driveways, parking lots, tennis courts, or other hard-surfaced areas;
- (d) use of water to wash down buildings or structures for purposes other than immediate fire protection;
- (e) flushing gutters or permitting water to run or accumulate in any gutter or street;
- (f) use of water to fill, refill, or add to any indoor or outdoor swimming pools or Jacuzzi-type pools;
- (g) use of water in a fountain or pond for aesthetic or scenic purposes except where necessary to support aquatic life;
- (h) failure to repair a controllable leak(s) within a reasonable period after having been given notice directing the repair of such leak(s); and
- (i) use of water from hydrants for construction purposes or any other purposes other than firefighting.

Odd numbered address: street addresses, box numbers, or rural postal route numbers ending in 1, 3, 5, 7, or 9.

SECTION VII: INITIATION AND TERMINATION OF DROUGHT RESPONSE STAGES

Undine’s Sr. Vice President of Operations or his/her designee (the “Operator”) will monitor water supply and demand conditions on a daily basis and determine when conditions warrant initiation of each stage of the Plan. The Operator will also determine when conditions warrant removal of a stage of a Plan, which will generally be the third day following the day when conditions fall below those “triggers.”

Undine will take the following actions when it initiates or terminates a drought stage:

- Notify customers through subdivision sign postings and/or providing information on its website.
- Notify the TCEQ Executive Director within 5 business days (upon activation of any mandatory provisions of the Plan).

The Operator may decide not to order the termination of a drought response stage or water emergency even though the conditions for termination of the stage are met. Factors that could influence such a decision include, but are not limited to, the time of the year, weather conditions, or the anticipation of potential changed conditions that warrant the continuation of the drought stage.

Stage 1 - MILD Water Shortage Conditions

Triggers for Initiation

The Operator will implement the response target and response actions for Stage 1 annually from May 1 through September 30.

Response Target

Achieve a voluntary 10% percent reduction in total water use.

Customer Response Actions

- (a) Voluntarily limit the irrigation of landscaped areas with hose-end sprinklers or automatic irrigation systems pursuant to the following schedule:

<i>*Only between the hours of midnight and 10:00 a.m. and 8:00 p.m. to midnight on designated watering days.</i>	

- (b) Voluntarily practice water conservation and minimize or discontinue Non-Essential Water Use.

Utility Measures:

On or about May 1 of each year, Undine will provide its customers with water conservation educational materials designed to inform its customers on the importance of water conservation and provide strategies to achieve individual water conservation. In addition, Undine will provide a copy of the Plan to its employees and staff and educate them on the Plan. It will work closely with applicable groundwater conservation districts, including providing timely information to them on water levels, water quality, and pumping demands. It will conduct leak surveys as necessary and repair any identified leaks on a timely basis.

Stage 2 - MODERATE Water Shortage Conditions

Triggers for Initiation

The Operator will implement the response target and response actions for Stage 2 when one or more of the following conditions is met:

- o Total well run time for a well equals or exceeds 15 hours for 3 consecutive days; or
- o The percent of water treatment and/or production capacity reaches 60% for 3 or more days in a 7-day period.

Response Target

Achieve a 20% percent reduction in total water use.

Customer Response Actions

The following water use restrictions shall apply to all customers (subject to the enforcement provisions in Section IX):

- (a) Irrigation of landscaped areas with hose-end sprinklers or automatic irrigation systems, will be limited to the following schedule:

<i>*Midnight until 10:00 am and 8:00 pm to midnight</i>	

- (b) Use of water to wash any motor vehicle, motorbike, boat, trailer, airplane or other vehicle is prohibited except on designated watering days between the hours of midnight and 10:00 am and between 8:00 pm and midnight. Such washing, when allowed, shall be done with a hand-held bucket or a hand-held hose equipped with a positive shutoff nozzle for quick rises. Vehicle washing may be done at any time on the immediate premises of a commercial car wash or commercial service station. Further, such washing may be exempted from these regulations if the health, safety, and welfare of the public is contingent upon frequent vehicle cleansing, such as garbage trucks and vehicles used to transport food and perishables.
- (c) Use of water to fill, refill, or add to any indoor or outdoor swimming pools, wading pools, or Jacuzzi-type pools is prohibited except on designated watering days between the hours of midnight and 10:00 am and between 8 pm and midnight.
- (d) Operation of any ornamental fountain or pond for aesthetic or scenic purposes is prohibited except where necessary to support aquatic life or where such fountains or ponds are equipped with a recirculation system.
- (e) Use of water from hydrants shall be limited to firefighting, related activities, or other activities necessary to maintain public health, safety, and welfare, except that use of water from designated fire hydrants for construction purposes may be allowed under special permit from Undine.

- (f) Use of water for the irrigation of golf course greens, tees, and fairways is prohibited except on designated watering days between the hours of midnight and 10:00 am and between 8 pm and midnight. However, if the golf course utilizes a water source other than that provided by Undine, the facility shall not be subject to these regulations.
- (g) All restaurants are prohibited from serving water to patrons except upon request of the patron.
- (h) Non-Essential water use is prohibited.

Utility Measures:

In addition to the measures taken under the previous stage(s), Undine will minimize water main flushing and public landscape irrigation.

Stage 3 - SEVERE Water Shortage Condition

Triggers for Initiation

The Operator will implement the response target and response actions for Stage 3 when one or more of the following conditions is met:

- o Total well run time for a well equals or exceeds 18 hours for 3 consecutive days; or
- o The percent of water treatment and/or production capacity reaches 75% for 3 or more days in a 7-day period.

Response Target

Achieve a 30% reduction in total water use.

Response Actions

The following water use restrictions shall apply to all customers (subject to the enforcement provisions in Section IX):

- (a) All requirements of Stage 2 shall be in effect during Stage 3.
- (b) Irrigation of landscaped areas will be limited to the following schedule and restrictions:

Irrigation shall be by means of hand-held hoses, hand-held hose-end, hand-held buckets, drip irrigation, or permanently installed automatic sprinkler systems only. The use of hose-end sprinklers is prohibited at all times.

- (c) The watering of golf course tees is prohibited unless the golf course utilizes a water source other than that provided by Undine.
- (d) The use of water for construction purposes from designated fire hydrants under special permit is to be discontinued.

Utility Measures:

Undine provides a copy of the Plan to its employees and staff and educates them on the Plan. It will work closely with applicable groundwater conservation districts, including providing timely information to them on water levels, water quality, and pumping demands. It will conduct leak surveys as necessary and repair any identified leaks on a timely basis.

Stage 4 - CRITICAL Water Shortage Conditions

Triggers for Initiation

The Operator will implement the response target and response actions for Stage 4 when one or more of the following conditions is met:

- o Total well run time for a well equals or exceeds 22 hours for 3 consecutive days; or
- o The percent of water treatment and/or production capacity reaches 90% for 3 or more days in a 7-day period.

Response Target

Achieve a 40 percent reduction in total water use.

Response Actions

The following water use restrictions shall apply to all customers (subject to the enforcement provisions in Section IX):

- (a) All requirements of Stage 3 shall be in effect during Stage 4.
- (b) Irrigation of landscaped areas will be limited to the following schedule and restrictions:

Saturdays and Wednesdays	Odd Numbers*
<i>*Between 6:00 am and 10:00 am and 8:00 pm to midnight</i>	

Irrigation shall be by means of hand-held hoses, hand-held buckets, or drip irrigation only. The use of a hose-end sprinkler or permanently installed automatic sprinkler system are prohibited at all times.

- (c) Use of water to wash any motor vehicle, motorbike, boat, trailer, airplane or other vehicle not occurring on the premises of a commercial car wash and commercial service stations and not in the immediate interest of public health, safety, and welfare is prohibited. Further, such vehicle washing at commercial car washes and commercial service stations shall occur only between the hours of 6:00 am and 10:00 am and between 6:00 pm and 10:00 pm
- (d) The filling, refilling, or adding of water to swimming pools, wading pools, and Jacuzzi-type pools is prohibited.
- (e) Operation of any ornamental fountain or pond for aesthetic or scenic purposes is prohibited except where necessary to support aquatic life or where such fountains or ponds are equipped with a recirculation system.
- (f) No application, expanded, or increased-in-size water service connections, meters, service lines, pipeline extensions, mains, or water service facilities of any kind shall be approved, and time limits for approval of such applications are hereby suspended for such time as this drought response state or a higher-numbered state shall be in effect.
- (g) In addition, due to the extreme nature of Stage 4, Undine reserves the right to prescribe a monthly consumption limit for customers to ensure it is able to meet the required reduction for the system.

Utility Measures:

Undine will continue to implement the measures identified in the previous stage(s).

Stage 5 - EMERGENCY Water Shortage ConditionsTriggers for Initiation

The Operator will implement the response target and response actions for Stage 5 when one or more of the following conditions is met:

1. Upon notification by the managing groundwater conservation district or regional surface water authority that the district or authority has declared an exceptional drought;
2. Major water line break, pump or other equipment failure, or other failure to the system which causes unprecedented loss of capability to provide water service; or
3. Natural or man-made contamination of the water supply source(s).

Response Target

Achieve a 50 percent reduction in total water use.

Response Actions

The following water use restrictions shall apply to all customers (subject to the enforcement provisions in Section IX):

- (a) All requirements of Stages 2 - 4 shall be in effect during Stage 5.
- (b) Irrigation of landscaped areas is prohibited.
- (c) Use of water to wash any vehicle, motorbike, boat, trailer, airplane or other vehicle is prohibited.
- (d) In addition, due to the extreme nature of Stage 5, Undine reserves the right to prescribe a monthly consumption limit for customers to ensure it is able to meet the required reduction for the system.

Utility Measures:

Undine will continue to implement the measures identified in the previous stage(s).

SECTION VIII: ENFORCEMENT OF MANDATORY RESTRICTIONS

No person shall knowingly or intentionally allow the use of water from Undine for residential, commercial, industrial, agricultural, governmental, or any other purpose in a manner contrary to any provision of this Plan, or in an amount in excess of that permitted by the drought response stage in effect at the time pursuant to action taken by the Sr. Vice President of Operations or his/her designee, in accordance with provisions of this Plan. Undine will enforce the mandatory water use restrictions set out in the Plan.

- Customers violating a mandatory water use restriction for the first time will be given a written warning of the violation.
- Customers violating a mandatory water use restriction for a second and subsequent times may be issued a fine of not less than \$100 and not more than \$2,000 per incident, with the level of fine determined by the Vice President of Operations or his/her designee based on the repetitive nature of the violation and the severity of the violation.
- Undine may install a flow restrictor in the line of a customer to limit the amount of water allowed to pass through the meter in a 24-hour period consistent with the management water use restriction in response to a customer violating a mandatory water use restriction for a second time. Undine may charge the customer for the cost of installing and removing the flow restrictor, at an amount not to exceed \$50.00 for each installation or removal.
- Undine may cut off water service to a customer for the duration of the water use restriction in response to a customer violating a mandatory water use restriction for a third time. Undine may assess its normal reconnect fee for restoration of service.

SECTION IX: VARIANCES

The Operator, may, in writing, grant a temporary variance for existing water uses otherwise prohibited under this Plan if the Vice President of Operations determines that failure to grant such variance would cause an emergency condition adversely affecting the health, sanitation, or fire protection for the public or the person requesting such variance and if one or more of the following conditions are met:

- (a) Compliance with this Plan cannot be technically accomplished during the duration of the water supply shortage or other condition for which the Plan is in effect.
- (b) Alternative methods can be implemented which will achieve the same level of reduction in water use.

Customers requesting an exemption from the provisions of this Plan shall file a petition for variance with Undine's Sr. Vice President of Operations or his/her designee will monitor water within five (5) days after the Plan or a particular drought response stage has been invoked. Petitions shall be submitted to the Sr. Vice President of Operations or his/her designee, at 17861 Telge Rd., Cypress, Texas 77429. All petitions for variances shall be reviewed by Undine's Sr. Vice President of Operations or his/her designee, and shall include the following:

- (a) Name and address of the petitioner(s).
- (b) Purpose of water use.
- (c) Specific provision(s) of the Plan from which the petitioner is requesting relief.
- (d) Detailed statement as to how the specific provision of the Plan adversely affects the petitioner or what damage or harm will occur to the petitioner or others if petitioner complies with this Ordinance.
- (e) Description of the relief requested.
- (f) Period of time for which the variance is sought.
- (g) Alternative water use restrictions or other measures the petitioner is taking or proposes to take to meet the intent of this Plan and the compliance date.
- (h) Other pertinent information.
